CIVIC CLUB DOES MUCH TO AID POOR

Report of Nurse in Charge of Charity Shows Many Families Are Aided

The report of Miss Agnes Wilcox, the nurse in charge of the Steelton Civic Club's charity work, for the month of March, made public this morning, throws an interesting light on industrial conditions in Steelton and shows the magnitude of the work being done by this branch of the Civic Club.

During the past month alone there were eighteen families who appealed the Civic Club for assistance of some kind. Of this number ten of the applicants for aid had never been compelled to ask assistance before and eight of the number had been on the lists for some time.

Through the efforts of the Civic nurse, homes were found for two small children whose parents were either dead or unable to support them. One person applied for help to locate relatives of whom trace had been lost. Nine families were supplied with coal, one with medicine, one man was helped to secure work.

The nurse paid professional visits to many homes in the borough where trained assistance was needed. On many of these visits instructions were given on sanitation, the care and feeding of babies, on caring for the sick and the dressing of wounds. Just how many of these calls were made was not stated in the report.

Since the organization of the Associated Charities a short time ago the efficiency of the charity work in the borough has been greatly increased. Miss Agnes Wilcox, the Civic nurse, is also in charge of the Associated Charities investigation work. Her assistant, Miss Miriam Punch, takes care of the clerical work of the organization which enables Miss Wilcox to devote more time to investigation and social uplift work.

CALL HOLLIDAYSBURG MAN

At a congregational meeting last evening the First Reformed Church extended an unanimous call to the Rev. Charles A. Huyette, of Hollidaysburg, Pa., to become the pastor of their church. The selection of a new pastor for the First Reformed Church was made necessary by the resignation of the Rev. Fred A. Cook several months ago. At last evening's meeting the trustees were authorized to make extensive improvements to the church building, Second and Swatara streets. Repairs will be made to the roof and the interior will be repainted and decorated.

NEW RESERVE BANKS READY FOR BUSINESS

banks in the twelve districts would immediately begin preparing for the establishment of their reserve banks. Every bank, under the law, must begin payment of a subscription of 6 per cent. of its capital and surplus to the stock of its reserve bank within thirty days after notification.

Must Subscribe \$4,000,000
In accordance with the law, as soon as the member banks in a district have subscribed the minimum amount of stock for a reserve bank—\$4,000,000—five banks will be designated to execute the formal certificate of organization.

After its reception here the reserve bank will become a corporation and entitled to begin business.

The next step will be the selection of boards of directors for the reserve banks. There will be nine directors for each bank, three to be appointed by the Federal Reserve Board, which itself is yet to be named by President Wilson, and six elected by the member banks in each district.

No Retirement Lacked
Although a Federal Reserve Board is to choose three directors in each reserve bank and appoint a reserve agent for each bank, who is to act as its mouthpiece, the organization committee may prefer the organization of a reserve bank for all practical purposes before the reserve board is appointed, and it is believed that the committee will exercise this authority to launch the system as soon as possible.

In the opinion of officials here the transfer of money from member banks in payment of their subscriptions to reserve banks will be accomplished without disturbance to business and without any curtailment of credit or retrenchment in loans or discounts.

The law gives nearly a year to the banks for the payment of one-half of their total subscriptions, and it was believed that this time would prove amply sufficient in every case.

Country Districted
The twelve districts and the twelve cities selected for the location of the federal reserve banks are as follows:

- District No. 1—Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Rhode Island and Connecticut, with the city of Boston as the location of the federal reserve bank.
- District No. 2—New York, with New York city as the location of the federal reserve bank.
- District No. 3—New Jersey, Delaware and all that part of Pennsylvania located east of the western boundary of the following counties: McKean, Elk, Clearfield, Cambria and Bedford, including Harrisburg and the surrounding towns, with the federal reserve bank in the city of Philadelphia.
- District No. 4—Ohio, all that part of Pennsylvania lying west of District No. 3; the counties of Marshall, Ohio, Brooke and Hancock in the State of West Virginia, and all that part of Kentucky located east of the western boundary of the following counties: Boone, Grant, Scott, Woodford, Jessamine, Garrard, Lincoln, Pulaski and McCreary, with the city of Cleveland, Ohio, as the location of the federal reserve bank.
- District No. 5—District of Columbia, Maryland, Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina and all of West Virginia except the counties of Marshall, Ohio, Brooke and Hancock, with the federal reserve bank located in the city of Richmond, Va.
- District No. 6—Alabama, Georgia and Florida, all that part of Tennessee located east of the western boundary of the following counties: Stewart, Houston, Wayne, Humphreys and Perry; all that part of Mississippi located south of the northern boundary of the following counties: Issaquena, Sharkey, Yazoo, Kemper, Madison, Leake and Neshoba; and all of the southeastern part of Louisiana located east of the western boundary of the following counties: Pointe Coupee, Iberville, Assumption and Terrebonne, with the city of Atlanta, Ga., as the location of the federal reserve bank.
- District No. 7—Iowa, all that part of Wisconsin located south of the northern boundary of the following counties: Vernon, Sauk, Columbia, Dodge, Washington and Osaukee; all of the southern peninsula of Michigan, viz: that part east of Lake Michigan; all that part of Illinois located north of a line forming the southern boundary of the following counties: Hancock, Schuyler, Cass, Sangamon, Christian, Shelby, Cumberland and Clark; and all that part of Indiana north of a line forming the southern boundary of the following counties: Vigo, Clay, Owen, Monroe, Brown, Bartholomew, Jennings, Ripley and Ohio, with the federal reserve bank located in the city of Chicago, Ill.
- District No. 8—Arkansas, all that part of Missouri located east of the western boundary of the following counties: Harrison, Davies, Caldwell, Ray, Lafayette, Johnson, Henry, St. Clair, Cedar, Dade, Lawrence and Barry; all that part of Illinois not included in District No. 7; all that part of Indiana not included in District No. 7; all that part of Kentucky not included in District No. 7; all that part of Tennessee not included in District No. 6; and all that part of Mississippi not included in District No. 6, with the city of St. Louis, Mo., as the location of the federal reserve bank.
- District No. 9—Montana, North Dakota, South Dakota, Minnesota, all that part of Wisconsin not included in District No. 7; and all that part of Michigan not included in District No. 7, with the city of Minneapolis, Minn., as the location of the federal reserve bank.
- District No. 10—Kansas, Nebraska, Colorado, Wyoming, all that part of Missouri not included in District No. 8; all that part of Oklahoma north of a line forming the southern boundary of the following counties: Ellis, Dewey, Blain, Canadian, Cleveland, Pottawatomie, Seminole, Okfuskee, McIntosh, Muskogean and Sequoyan; and all that part of New Mexico north of a line forming the southern boundary of the following counties: McKinley, Sandoval, Santa Fe, San Miguel and Union, with the city of Kansas City, Mo., as the location of the federal reserve bank.
- District No. 11—Texas, all that part of New Mexico not included in District No. 10; all that part of Oklahoma not included in District No. 10; all that part of Louisiana not included in District No. 6, and the following counties in the State of Arizona: Pima, Graham, Greenlee, Cochise and Santa Cruz, with the city of Dallas, Texas, as the location of the federal reserve bank.
- District No. 12—California, Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Nevada, Utah and all that part of Arizona not included in District No. 11, with the city of San Francisco, Cal., as the location of the federal reserve bank.

Congressmen May Vote by Pressing Electrical Button
An electrical device which, by automatically recording the votes of the

members, will replace the arduous task of calling the roll in the national House of Representatives is being considered by the rules committee of that legislative body. Aside from eliminating the forty-five-minute roll call, this device will do away with the delay in action sometimes caused by obstinate minorities.

To record the attendance and votes of the members, at the same time preventing interference from unauthorized persons, the apparatus will consist of locked push-buttons at each Representative's seat and a recording device operating on the principle of an adding machine.

To each member of the House will be assigned a particular seat, which will be numbered. At each of these positions there will be a push-button for indicating a positive or negative vote, the presence of the seat hold, and possibly a paired vote.
