HABITS—Part II.

I am going to talk today of little tricks of expression that come from over working some muscle of the face, and I am going to talk right out to the young girl, for she is the greatest sinner in this respect. I mean the young girl that we meet on the train, the girl we see in tea rooms, at home, or at school who, when she is not talking, distorts her face with frowns, twists her mouth, bites her lips and indulges in other facial gymnastics. I think some girls do this through embarrassment, they fancy it conceals the self-consciousness of which they are acutely aware; in other cases I think there is an idea that such mannerisms are pretty and desirable. Frowns and frowns may occasionally away an enraptured lover, but facial distortions are a dubious method of attracting favorable attention, and their after effects on the countenance is deplorable. So, my pretty girls, if you are "making up faces," as the children do, to attract attention, I beg you to stop it. You will not get the kind of attention you want and the habit will leave unpleasant lines on even your smooth skin.

Putulence and bad temper suggest not so much the spoiled beauty, as beauty spoiled. The unthinking may be amused at the sight of a pretty child in a rage, but no one would wish to live permanently with ill temper or with a face that shows the marks of it. So do not get into the habit of simulating any emotion the marks of which you would dread to see permanently stamped on your countenance.

Facial Exercises for Lines and Wrinkles.

One of the latest ideas in beautifying consists of what are termed facial exercises. These are designed to exercise certain muscles of the face that have become weakened by disuse and, by so doing, erase the lines and wrinkles into which the loose skin has fallen. The theory behind this work, the correcting of bad facial habits, is excellent.

Find the Cause of Wrinkles.

I advise my pupils when a line appears in the face always to find the cause of it. It comes, as a rule, either from some unfortunate trick of expression, or from holding the head badly or too constantly in the same position. Tensing the mouth will make unpleasant lines about it, pursing it will bring a little cluster of lines radiating towards the upper lip, and allowing the lips to habitually droop will wear on even your smooth skin. While these lines are light, they can be erased by massage, but it must be remembered that they will return unless the facial habits that formed them are corrected. To be continued.
