election and acquiesced in all that had been done subsequently to and in pursuance of the order of the court. This would seem to be a ratification of the whole proceeding. If, as contended by the Commonwealth, the borough council alone had authority to make the order and thus to commence the proceedings which became the subject of the question, it follows that it had the power to ratify that which was done, for the power to ratify is involved in the power to authorize. Whether it originally authorized the election or not, if it afterwards ratified it, that it seems to us, ought to have closed the matter against all controversy, especially as it is not suggested that any of the requirements of the statute which provide for the submission of the question to the people were complied with, excepting that relating to the initiation of the question.
