Easton Is Benefited by Mammoth Contract

Easton, Pa., April 17. - The Taylor-Wharton Iron and Steel Company has awarded a contract to the Westinghouse-Kerr Company, of New York, for the 25-acre plant the company is to erect in Easton and for enlargements to its present plant at High Bridge, N. J. The contract aggregates \$2,000,000, of which more than \$1,000,000 is to be the initial outlay for the new Easton works. On the day that the company begins work the Board of Trade will begin the erection of 100 dwelling houses in the vicinity of the works as part of its agreement with the company, and the Jersey Central Railroad will start construction of its new industrial spur from Hope to the site to be occupied by the Taylor-Wharton plant. It is estimated that 300 or more houses will go up this summer in the vicinity of the plant.

"Thwart Wilson" Is Cry of Jersey Leaders

Trenton, N. J., April 17. - The attitude of President Wilson on the Panama Canal tolls question was severely scored here at a meeting of Democrats, Progressives and Republicans, who by a unanimous vote passed resolutions calling upon Senator Martine to get help from Senator Hughes in thwarting the attempt of the President to hold control of the canal over to England. Senator Barton B. Hutchinson aroused the meeting to a pitch of prolonged applause when he asked why Wilson did not tell his board of directors why he wanted them to reverse the position of a majority of the citizens of this country on this question.
