

PENROSE SAYS NATION UPHOLDS PRESIDENT

All Patriotic Men Will Fight For Flag in Mexico, Senator Tells Sons of Veterans

Special to The Telegraph. Philadelphia, April 20.—"On the eve of possible conflict with Mexico, every man, Republican or Democrat, or anything else, will be found ready to support the flag and see it honored and respected as it should be."

Senator Penrose made this assertion while addressing the members of the Major M. A. Gherst camp, No. 51, Sons of Veterans, at a celebration held in honor of the forty-ninth anniversary of the surrender of Appomattox in Darby.

The speaker struck a responsive chord when he asserted that, despite any differences of opinion over the manner in which the "Wilson Administration had handled the Mexican situation, every Senator and Representative, with party lines swept away, would stand back of the President in support of any measure he might propose for upholding the dignity and honor of the American flag.

Cheers greeted his utterance that the events of the last few days had drawn the country dangerously near armed intervention, and that such an enterprise, if begun, might lead to the requirements of occupation and pacification, to such an extent as to involve the use not only of our regular military establishment, but a large number of volunteers.

The Senator's warlike talk was woven into an address which, in the main, was a severe arraignment of the Wilson Administration's policy in foreign affairs, with special stress on Mexico. Not only was President Wilson criticized as being responsible for the present state of affairs, which seemed to indicate intervention, but Secretary of State Bryan was characterized as inexperienced in diplomatic affairs.

The speaker held that the Administration's policy on the Mexican situation had been one series of blunders; that by refusing to recognize Huerta and had given moral support to Villa and the rebels, "whose record for

murder, arson, brigandage and treachery is far worse than the de facto head of the country."

Deplores Choice of Bryan

Senator Penrose paid his compliments to the President and to Secretary Bryan in this fashion: "As a student, as a pedagogue, as a governor, 'President Wilson had no necessity to interest himself in diplomatic affairs. Notwithstanding this fact, instead of selecting for the responsible position of head of the Department with these problems, he chose one who had achieved great reputation in other fields of political activity. The results were that we have been led into a mortifying tangle of contradiction, inconsistencies, and even embarrassments with other nations."

Following up this argument, Senator Penrose practically accused the Wilson Administration of affording assistance to Villa and his rebel army, adding: "Mexico would have been practically at peace had we not intervened, or, if you prefer the word, interfered. There can be political or financial intervention; and in both these ways we have been intervening in Mexico for over a year. It is armed intervention that I still hope means may be found to avert. But when I consider the inaptitude of this Administration in its foreign policy, my feeling on the subject becomes rather a desire than a hope."

THE POWER OF DICKENS
