Valuables Found in Hotel Ruins by Sunday Visitors

Special to The Telegraph Waynesboro, Pa., April 21.—Over one thousand persons spent Sunday afternoon in the Blue Ridge Mountains at Pen-Mar Park, Highfield and the Ridge Summit, and one-half that number were from Waynesboro.

The ruins of the Blue Mountain house, which was destroyed by fire on August 5, was visited by many persons, who hunted for souvenirs by digging in the ashes. Many were rewarded for their trouble and succeeded in unearthing some valuables.

Howard Spangler, who lives on the corner of North Grant and West North streets, Waynesboro, dug up a silver pocket and chain, which was in fair condition after passing through such intense heat. On one side of the locket were the initials "G. L. L." and on the opposite side the year "1912".

A photograph inside had been reduced to a little piece of charred paper. Mr. Spangler also found near the locket and chain two gold bracelets, one a carved bead bracelet and the other a round one. One of the bracelets had been burst by the heat. These articles of jewelry were found near some trunks and a lock of a trunk and evidently was the property of a young lady who was a guest at the hotel and had to flee from the burning building.

J. M. Mackley, North Franklin street, Waynesboro, found a silver pocket knife that probably belonged to Bond and Gibbons, who were proprietors of the Blue Mountain House.
