RESOLUTIONS HIT M'CORMICK HARD

Democratic League Says Democracy Should Be Delivered From Vance C. McCormick

SLAPPED IN HIS HOME TOWN

Labor Record Set Forth in Detail of Resolutions Adopted - Last Evening

Resolutions praying that the Democracy of Pennsylvania be delivered from Vance C. McCormick because of his labor record were adopted by the Dauphin County Democratic League last night at a meeting held in the Wash Building. The league was formed here after McCormick had announced his candidacy and his newspaper had denounced Ryan for entering the field.

President Hartman handed McCormick a few choice knocks at the start of the meeting, and then presented B. F. Meyers, who spoke on Democratic principles and the right of man to think as he pleases, to run for office if he pleases and to vote for whom he pleases.

Other speakers were Calder E. Shanno, candidate for the House; Bart Shelby, Steelton; Charles Myers, Middletown; City Chairman H. O. Holstein and others.

The resolutions, which were evidently the result of considerable search of files of newspapers, were adopted as follows:

"The campaign to determine whether the Democratic Organization of Pennsylvania shall be controlled by a small contingent of office brokers or directed by the unthought, unbossed

and unawed men who have been faithful in the past and are earnest and zealous for the future, is drawing to a close. It has been a campaign of scandal and vituperation upon the part of the self-appointed party bosses and hand-picked candidates they are trying to force upon the people, but in their own estimation they have not been able to fasten a charge against Michael J. Ryan, the candidate of the people, who stands unscathed and beyond reproach.

"A. Mitchell Palmer, Vance C. McCormick and William T. Cressy have hurried another until they are hoarse against Colonel James M. Guffey, Senator J. K. P. Hall, Judge John M. Garman and others who are not candidates before the people, but they have not dared to frame an aspersion against Mr. Ryan. Palmer and Cressy have been willing beneficiaries of the bounty of the gentlemen they are assailing, and in 1902, when McCormick was first seized with the absurd idea that he is fit for Governor, he was willing and anxious to have the help of Colonel Guffey to promote his ambition. But because Colonel Guffey concluded that the late Robert E. Pattison was a better representative of the Democracy than McCormick, at that time, McCormick has been his malignant enemy since.

"When Vance C. McCormick was Mayor of Harrisburg he vetoed an ordinance of Councils increasing the wages of employees of the city one and two-thirds cents an hour. His message that carried over into the families of many worthy citizens was presented when it was impossible to get a quorum of Councils to overrule it. The body to which it was read was unanimously in favor of passing it over the veto, but less than a quorum being present the action could not be taken. If he were Governor and the Legislature should enact legislation in the interest of labor during the closing days of the session, and such legislation is usually delayed until that time, he would probably veto it, and claim, because it hadn't been passed over the veto, that the Legislature and the public acquiesced in his act.

"But McCormick's hostility to workmen and organized labor is not limited to his veto of the wage ordinance. When he acquired control and assumed ownership of the Harrisburg Patriot, one of his first acts of authority was to take the Union Label from the

masthead where it had long reposed. He was willing to pay current wages because he couldn't get efficient labor otherwise, but he could and did give organized labor a hard jolt by removing the sign of sympathy with the Typographical Union. In some way he has been able to get some printers outside of Harrisburg to endorse this act of enmity, but John D. Rockefeller, head of the Colorado Fuel and Iron Company, has been able, by the same methods, probably, to get some of the employees of that corporation to endorse his labor record and policies. It is said that money moves mountains.

"Another incident of his administration as Mayor of Harrisburg indicates his bent on the labor question. He called one of the city supervisors into his office on one occasion and asked him to have all old men employed on the street force discharged because their age impaired their efficiency. He was assured that in the work they were performing the old men were as efficient as younger laborers, but that didn't satisfy him. Then, what shall we do with the old men? asked the supervisor. They ought to be sent to asylums, he replied. They were mostly old soldiers suffering from maladies of camp life or wounds of battle. But neither their infirmities nor their necessities appealed to the plutocrat enjoying unearned millions.

"If Vance C. McCormick is nominated by the Democrats of Pennsylvania as their candidate for Governor, these just charges will have to be reckoned with. We will enter a campaign of defense without hope of retribution. We implore the honest Democratic voters of the State to deliver us from such a dilemma. Give us Michael J. Ryan as our candidate and victory is certain. He is essentially of and for the plain people. He knows what wage-earners want because he has been of them and he understands the requirements of business and capital because he has his self-acquired interest in them. For these reasons the Democratic League of Dauphin county favors the nomination of Michael J. Ryan and his associates on the people's ticket and urges all faithful and hopeful Democrats to join it in bringing about this beneficent result."

Fall of Tampico Adds Another Chapter to the Mexican Situation

Washington, D. C., May 14.—The reported capture of Tampico by Constitutionalists after a prolonged stubborn siege that ended with fierce fighting in the heart of the seaport added a new chapter to-day to the exciting history of the Mexican situation. While the South American envoys and members of the American mission prepared for the Niagara Falls conference next Monday officials in diplomatic and government circles discussed the possibility of developments that might grow out of the rebel victory.

It was believed the constitutionalists immediately would move to import arms and ammunition through Tampico for use in their southern campaign. If that were permitted some officials suggested to-day that Huerta probably would protest that the halting of shipments of arms for him at Vera Cruz was unjust.

Despite the possibility of such a development the view was taken in quarters that the capture of Tampico would dispel embarrassing circumstances created by the menace to big foreign interests in the territory. President Wilson was expected to make representations to rebel leaders aimed at resumption of operations in the oil field.

Fear For Oil Lands That General Zaragora's federalists might attempt extreme reprisals in their reported retreat from Tampico was a fear unofficially expressed here to-day. It was suggested that as they fled back from the coast through the rich oil territory they might ignite tanks and petroleum, directing its flow into the river and threatening a disastrous fire in Tampico. Military observers here stated that such a move was not to be unexpected.

Maas Reported Removed Unofficial reports that Huerta had removed General Maas, commander of the troops who were driven out of Vera Cruz during the American occupa-

patron, and named as his successor General Pena, were received with varying interpretations here. Fear was expressed in some quarters that it might forecast an aggressive move toward the United States. Vera Cruz reports indicate that General Funston is in fear of no serious attack.

While the military operations, as the spectacular side of the international drama excited absorbing interest to-day, the South American envoys and the American mission proceeded with plans for their departure for Niagara Falls. All fear that the Huerta delegation would not arrive in time for the beginning of the conference was dispelled by the announcement that they were to proceed direct from Havana to Key West. They should reach Florida not later than Friday. That would give them ample time to reach the Canadian border town for the beginning of the negotiations.

Island Incident Closed

The "occupation" of Lobos Island which threatened complex developments earlier in the week appeared to have simmered down to-day to the point where it would cause no hitch in the program for mediation preliminaries. The fact that the Lobos lighthouse immediately would be turned over to the Mexicans if they agreed to maintain the great beacon, so important to shipping was regarded as ample assurance that the incident could not be construed as an act of aggression, despite Huerta's protest to the envoys. It seemed possible that the report that Huerta had ordered the suspension of lights on the Pacific coast to hamper American shipping would not be finally acted upon before the conference got under way.

J. F. Ommert, the Eighth Ward contractor, charged with assaulting Robert Rosenberg, an attorney, was held for court in the sum of \$200 bail this afternoon. The hearing took place before Mayor John K. Roy.

With a bullet from a gun in his left leg, Ray Kerr, aged 20, of 422 Hamilton street, was brought to the Harrisburg Hospital, this morning shortly before 1 o'clock.
