News Items of Interest in Central Pennsylvania

Reading.—At yesterday's eighteenth annual conference of the Women's Home and Foreign Missionary Society of the Reading Conference of the Evangelical Lutheran Ministerium of Pennsylvania, here, it was decided to change the name to the Women's Missionary Society of the Reading Lutheran Conference of Pennsylvania and Adacent States.

Reading.—Alexander Hovitskie, a young man, was found dead in front of his home here yesterday. It is believed that while ascending the steps to enter the house he fell to the sidewalk from heart disease. His neck was broken.

Mission House May Be Moved From West

Lancaster, Pa., May 15.—Considerable time was devoted to-day by the general synod of the Reformer Church to the discussion of the proposition to remove the mission house a Franklin, near Sheboygan, Wis., to some other point. No action will be taken until a later date. Additional committees were appointed and the home mission board presented a report in which they recommended that the general synod apportion the sum of \$250,000 annually for home missions during the next decennium.
