the authorities. Hazel, it is said, called Cramacelli. It is Italian was referred to frequently as "Hazel's fellow."

Evidence implicating Cramacelli was secured to-day through the efforts of Jerome Kaufman, a constable, and two friends of Parker Myers, the girl's father.

Neither District Attorney Casper Alexander, Detective Harry Bentley or Chief of Police Daniel Vaughan, or Carlisle, will talk about the new evidence.

The Cramacelli Clue The father was the first to tell of his daughter's frequent visits to an aunt, Miss Lizzie Myers, residing near the Fair Grounds. This was the clue which the friends took up and finally brought Cramacelli to the case. The aunt said that Hazel Myers was at her home all day Thursday, and left at 7:30 in the evening, saying she was going to meet a friend at the Reading station.

On her way to the station Miss Myers met a Mrs. Annie Kaufman. Mrs. Kaufman, it is said, had been a confidant of the girl and had written letters for Hazel Myers to Cramacelli, and to the girl's father. Miss Myers said to Mrs. Kaufman, when asked where she was going:

Going to Meet "Ike" "Annie, I'm going to meet Ike, and we're going to have a H— of a time."

Miss Myers explained that she expected to meet "her fellow" at the Reading station. Mrs. Kaufman says she remarked:

"Hazel, you better stay away from those Italians. They will do you harm some time and you will be sorry."

Miss Myers said that through the direction of the Reading station. Employees about the station claim they saw the girl there about 8 o'clock, and with young fellow. They are unable to say whether the girl's companion was an Italian or a Carlisle Indian.

The Myers girl and her companion were seen later in a carriage. The local liveryman from whom the carriage was hired admits that one of his teams was used last Thursday night from the house. He was taken to the city and was unable to write.

Say They Heard Screams Mrs. Kaufman asserts she heard screams near her home as late as 1 o'clock and now believe that the girl wanted to get to her.

Mrs. Kaufman said she wrote letters to the young Italian for Miss Myers, who was unable to write.

By request of Miss Myers, Mrs. Kaufman wrote two letters to the girl's father, Parker Myers, stating that his daughter, Hazel, wanted to marry Cramacelli. Mrs. Kaufman's letters to his daughter but never gave his consent to the marriage.

of Cramacelli was found. On the back of the picture was written, "To my love, Hazel." It is said that in the arrest of George Bowermaster, a young man of this place, charged with furnishing liquor to minors, it was believed another clue has been discovered, showing jealousy to have been back of the murder of Hazel Myers. Bowermaster was arrested last night.

It is alleged to have been a member of a drinking party who visited Mount Holly Wednesday night and which, it is said, included Miss Myers. Complete details could not be obtained owing to the absence of District Attorney Alexander.

A local liveryman, said to be known to the district attorney, hired a team to the young men Wednesday night. In the party were three men and three women. The party drove to Mount Holly, Locust Grove and other points and drank whiskey and beer, returning to Carlisle early Thursday morning.

When the team was returned to the stable one of the girls was missing, a carriage, it was said, had been washed. When questioned as to why the carriage had been washed, the young man, said to have been Bowermaster, said they had driven into some woods and had done the work and that the girl had stopped off at a relative's house.

It is now believed that when the drinking party stopped at Mount Holly Miss Myers was discovered by her lover, Cramacelli, and that the quarrel on the following night was the result of this discovery.

E. E. Keizer, disciplinarian of the Carlisle Indian School, declared this morning that he considers it shameful to have the name of the school dragged into the murder of the girl, said Mr. Keizer.

"It's too bad that the report was circulated that an Indian student had been in the girl's murder. It makes me feel that the school should be made up of a lot of cut-throats and I do not believe that any student here was with the girl the night of the murder. It was reported in Carlisle yesterday."
