E. R. HUSTON DIES AT MECHANICSBURG

Well Known as Historian and Was Treasurer of Cumberland County

Special to The Telegraph. Mechanicburg, Pa., May 27.—E. Rankin Huston former treasurer of Cumberland county, an authority on local history, and for years a painter and interior decorator, died at his home here yesterday afternoon after a long illness. Mr. Huston had an operation performed in the Harrisburg Hospital a short time ago, but never fully recovered after his return home. He was in his seventy-first year.

E. Rankin Huston was the son of William C. and Mary Ann Huston and was born September 28, 1843 in the northern part of Silver Spring township, on the farm that for so many years was in the name of his grandfather, Samuel Huston. He spent the earlier years at his home, attending the public schools of the district until he had mastered the common branches. He then entered the Pennsylvania College of Trade and Finance, from which he graduated with honor in the class of 1867.

On December 4, 1873, he was married to Mary E. Walters, by the Rev. W. R. H. Decker, pastor of the Reformed Church in Mechanicburg. They began their married life in Mechanicburg, have always lived there and were prominent factors in its social and business life. E. Rankin Huston, like his ancestors, was a Democrat. On June 6, 1896, his party nominated him for the office of county treasurer by a majority of 1,600 over his opponent, and he was elected by a majority of 374 at the November election. In January, 1900, and again in 1908, he was nominated for the office of burgess of Mechanicburg, but owing to other engagements declined the nomination. He has been an association school director from a strong Republican ward and on each occasion was elected by a large majority. He has frequently represented his party in county and State conventions and held many positions of honor and trust.

Mr. Huston was a trustee and member of the Presbyterian Church, the church of his paternal Scotch-Irish ancestors. He has been active in fraternal and other orders, was a member of Eureka lodge, No. 302, F. and A. M.; treasurer of Samuel C. Perkins chapter, No. 209, E. A. R. M.; past master of the Pennsylvania; Harrisburg Consistory, A. A. S. R., thirty-second; Mechanicburg lodge, No. 215, I. O. O. F.; Melville lodge, No. 83, K. of P.; the grand lodge, K. of P., Pennsylvania, and treasurer of the Rescue Hook and Ladder Company, since the year of its organization, 1885. He was also a member of the Pennsylvania Historical Society; Pennsylvania Genealogical Society; Cumberland County Historical Society; Scotch-Irish Society of Pennsylvania, and Pennsylvania Society Sons of the Revolution.

Lover Tries Suicide Four Times Before Succeeding

Barr, leaving a note declaring that his slaying of his sweetheart, Florence Bentley, at his home, 140 South Main street, yesterday night was accidental, beneath a moving train here to-day and was killed. It was his fourth attempt at suicide. In the note he said he had taken a drug twice in his effort to die beside the body of his sweetheart but both times failed. In desperation he jumped into a quarry pit but he hit in the stagnant water and "couldn't sink" said the note. The clothing on his body was still wet when taken from the tracks. The note said that Miss Bentley was killed when he tried to kiss her. She screamed and he placed his hand over her mouth. In the ensuing struggle they tripped and fell. He believed her neck was broken.
