

Young Man Killed at Crossing During Storm

Lewistown, Pa., June 26.—Yesterday was the hottest day of the season here and humanity suffered greatly for the heat, the humidity was excessive and last night the hot wave was followed by a heavy electrical

storm. In Center county over the Seven Mountains from Mifflin county a barn was destroyed by fire caused by lightning. Orville Mayes, of ryanville, four miles west of here was in town in a buggy selling cherries and he started for home through the blinding storm. At a crossing just west of town known as the Spangler crossing, he had to cross a number of railroad tracks and here the horse and buggy was struck by a train. The young

man was instantly killed, as was also the horse and the buggy was demolished. Mayes was 19 years old.
