

TIN-PLATE MILL TO CLOSE FOR A WHILE

Lance-Grosjean People Say They Are Not Affected by Amalgamated's Action

While no date for the usual summer shutdown of the Lance-Grosjean tin plate company's plant for repairs, stock accounting, etc., has been fixed thus far, it is understood that the plant will be closed for several weeks at least in the near future. As a rule three or four weeks is the extent of the time allowed for the midsummer discontinuance of operations.

At the offices of the Lance company today it was said that the proposed closing down of the tin plate mills is not brought about by the action of the Amalgamated Association of Iron, Steel and Tin Plate Workers and manufacturers July 1 because of a disagreement of the wage scale. The existing scale expires June 30 and at a meeting of the representatives of the association at Atlantic City last week it was decided that the entire string of eighteen plants would close down July 1. This will affect something like 5,000 men who are employed in 110 sheet and 50 tin mills over the country.

"We are not a part of the Amalgamated Association," it was said at the offices of the Lance company today, "and we will not be affected by any action it might take."

Dauphin Mourns Death of Hannah Craig, "Old Mammy"

Dauphin, Pa., June 30.—All Dauphin is mourning for its "old mammy," Hannah Craig, who died on Sunday evening at the home of her sister, Mrs. William Hopkins, in Philadelphia. Hannah, who was taken ill last winter at her home on the mountain, was removed to Philadelphia shortly before Christmas. Although everything possible was done for her, she suffered a relapse and died on Sunday. Hannah was 72 years old, very deaf and almost blind. In spite of her deafness, she played the accordion for nearly everybody who went to see her. Many young people walked up the mountain to Hannah's house and danced to her rollicking music, or, on Sundays, listened reverently to her hymns.

Hannah came from the very oldest negro family around Dauphin. Her father, Andrew Craig, and her mother, Rachel, were slaves of John McAllister, of Fort Hunter. Hannah and her sister had been mammys to a great many of Dauphin's oldest families.

Funeral services were held today at her sister's home in Philadelphia, but burial will be made in the Craig burial ground formerly owned by John McAllister, but now owned by John Reily, of Fort Hunter.

Hannah is survived by her sister, Mrs. William Hopkins, of Philadelphia; Leonard Craig, who is section boss on the Reading Railroad, and Richard Craig, of Harrisburg.

State Constabulary in Complete Control of Strike Situation

Pittsburgh, June 30.—Dawn saw the State Constabulary in complete control of the situation in the strike district of the Turtle Creek Valley. Four troopers cleared the bridge leading to the Westinghouse Electric and Machine factories of the deputy sheriffs that has held it for three weeks and all persons were allowed to pass without question. Streets were patrolled by mounted men and the people kept moving. A great crowd of strikers assembled at the plant entrances to see who would return to work, and pickets were active under the restrictions laid down by Captain Adam when he visited strike headquarters last night. One man overstepped the bounds and was promptly arrested by a trooper.

Strict orders were given by the constabulary for the armed guards to remain in the works, and in no circumstances to show themselves on the streets with their guns. The guards stationed at the Pennsylvania station to protect the railroad property was reduced at daybreak.
