ODD FELLOWS WILL GATHER AT PEN-MAR

Preparations Being Made For Record-Breaking Attendance at Reunion in August

Special to The Telegraph Waynesboro, Pa., July 2.—Big as was the Odd Fellows' reunion at Pen-Mar last year, there is reason for the belief that the annual gathering of the order there on Thursday, August 6, will be even larger.

There will be eleven excursion trains to the park, as follows: On the Western Maryland from Baltimore, York, Shippensburg, Westminster, Cumberland and Hagerstown; on the Cumberland Valley Railroad from Harrisburg and Winchester; on the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad from Baltimore via Ellicott City; from Washington via Weverton; Norfolk and Western from Elkton, Va.; the first Odd Fellows' train ever run over this road to Pen-Mar. There will be large crowds carried also by the Chambersburg, Greencastle and Waynesboro and the Hagerstown trolley lines.

Chester A. Geesaman, Waynesboro, secretary of the reunion committee, is receiving daily reports from lodges in many sections, telling of much interest and of a prospective large attendance. Judge Paul A. Benson, of the Common Pleas Court of Erie county, grand master of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows in Pennsylvania, will preside over the meeting in the auditorium at Pen-Mar.

DROWNED MAN BURIED




