


Transfer Compulsory, Says Tri-State Leader

Unjust criticism and erroneous statements from York fans stirred up the Tri-State leader, President Graham, last night, who declared there is no disposition on the part of the Tri-State League to force the York club from membership, and said: "The league would consider it a most happy solution if the York club would meet its obligations, some of which are now two months overdue and a portion of which involves the salary of players, whose protection is a first consideration of the league. President Gerry, of the York club, in a letter, admits the inability of the club to meet these obligations and has expressed enthusiastic approval of the idea of transferring the team. The matter will be decided at a meeting of the Tri-State to be held within the next three days."

EAST END A. C. AT HOME


