Further Weakness in New Haven Is Shown

New Low Record of 52 Is Established in Wall Street; Bonds Were Irregular

By Associated Press New York, July 15.—Such tendencies as the market might have shown to improve its early position were nullified by further weakness in New Haven, which fell 3 1/2 points to 52, a new low record.
