good of the community, he contended. "For yourselves as well as the good of the city," interjected Commissioner Wallace dryly.

"Both" was the laconic rejoinder of the senator.

Mr. Nisley, who owns the building at 14 North Market Square, then said that he had come to believe that it developed that he had not complied with rules of the commission and filed papers. The commissioners decided to hear him anyway. He said in brief, that he did not want to see any more tracks in Market Square because there are enough and that tracks and crowds are bad things as a rule.

The extension granted the conditions complained of in Second street south of Market will be transferred to Market between Front and the Square, only if the extension is more dangerous," said Mr. Nisley. "Market street in that space is familiar as an automobile place. People coming into the city leave their cars there and there are three automobile supply houses along the street. Now, if you put in double tracks and there are half a dozen cars loading and unloading there, it will be a serious proposition when you think how automobiles enter the city by the Market street bridge, swing into Market street, turn on Front street and the Square, and how they go up Market to get to the river front."

Mr. Nisley was interrupted by Senator Beaman about the track in the Square, the senator saying that if a third track would be laid it would leave a space for highway purposes wider than many of the downtown business streets.

"How's the traffic there?" asked Commissioner Wright.

"Traffic's growing and more tracks will make it dangerous," said Mr. Nisley.

"There's more traffic in narrower streets in the business section," remarked Mr. Beaman.

"Well, traffic's growing now in Market Square and it takes two officers to keep it untangled and you run some risks now," retorted Mr. Nisley.

"The matter discussed were more for the City Council than the commission."

"Do you intend to object to City Council on this proposition?" asked Commissioner Pennypacker.

"Oh, I'd prefer to end it here," replied the attorney.

"It was my opinion," remarked Mr. Beaman, "no doubt," remarked Mr. Beaman.

Commissioner Pennypacker then asked whether it was the intention to apply for a franchise to go up Front street, now or later.

Every one connected with the company hastened to record a negative.

"This matter is based on necessity," said Mr. Beaman. "There are eighty-five cars now swinging into the Square. Not all at once, of course, but there are eighty-five entering and departing. Now, if you have a third track laid and to run them up along Market street in front of the Board of Trade, which you gentlemen are familiar with, there will be a terminal and waiting rooms and a place to have place to go instead of lounging along Second street and overflowing on Market Square Church steps, as has been the case here. These are local conditions which are to be considered. This would be beneficial to the people. What we ask is permission to negotiate with the City Council."

It was stated that if approval would be granted it would be without prejudice to the right to object before Council or before the commission when the ordinance comes up for approval.

The fact that the whole matter is one for local consideration was emphasized by the attorneys for the company.

NOTICE

The following ordinance was read in place in the City Council at its meeting held Tuesday afternoon, July 14, 1914, and is published as required by Article 5, Section 3, Clause 19, of the act of assembly approved June 27, 1913:

AN ORDINANCE To authorize the opening of Front street from Herr street to Calder street, and providing for the payment of the cost thereof.

SECTION 1. Be it ordained by the Council of the City of Harrisburg, and he is hereby directed to take the necessary proceedings to have Front street opened from the south side of Herr street to the north side of Calder street, as marked on the official map of the city of Harrisburg, and that purpose he is authorized, subject to the approval of Council, to agree with the property owners who own the damages caused by the opening of Front street as herein authorized.

SECTION 2. That the City Solicitor, in behalf of the city, and the property owners along said Front street, who are named in the annexed schedule, shall agree to the amount of compensation proper to be paid, or Council may, if the property owners do not confirm any such agreement, or does reject the same, the City Solicitor may, at the proper court for the appointment of viewers to assess the damages and to hear and report thereon.

SECTION 3. That the Superintendent of Streets and Public Improvements be and he is hereby authorized to provide for the damages mentioned in the first and second sections hereof shall have been properly adjusted to cause all obstructions now on the line of said street, between the points named, to be removed so that said highway may be hereafter graded.

AN ORDINANCE Authorizing the paving and curbing of Ethel Street from Eighteenth Street to Nineteenth Street, and providing for the payment of the cost thereof.

SECTION 1. Be it ordained by the Council of the City of Harrisburg, and he is hereby authorized to take the necessary proceedings to have Ethel Street from Eighteenth Street to Nineteenth Street paved with first class sheet asphalt, and the cost thereof to be paid for and the same is hereby authorized to be paved with first class sheet asphalt, and the cost thereof to be assessed according to the foot front rule and not to exceed two dollars per square yard for paving and sixty cents per linear foot for curbing.

MISSOURI PACIFIC FALLS TO LOW LEVEL

Leaders Held or Added to Their Gains; Movement in Some Quarters Considered Uncertain

New York, July 22. - Missouri Pacific fell abruptly to its recent low level under the impact of short selling, and Rock Island, Pfd., recorded its lowest price in sympathy with declines in other issues. Baltimore and Ohio was relatively strong, despite unfavorable year earnings, but Chesapeake and Ohio yielded to moderate offerings.

Leaders held or added to their gains, but by noon the movement in the market was more uncertain. Mexican and California Petroleum and other specialties, including Harvester, Best Sugar, Bethlehem Steel and American Tobacco, rose one to four points, but exercised no speculative influences. Weakness in Rock Island bonds extended to other issues, with losses of five to eight points in Missouri Pacific Convertibles, Colorado Midland four and Missouri, Kansas and Texas refundings.
