

NEW SWIMMING RECORD

Special to The Telegraph Indianapolis, Ind., Aug. 1.—Another C. A. U. record was broken yesterday in the final events of the three-day Central Amateur Athletic Union swimming meet, which closed this afternoon when McGilivray, of the Illinois Athletic Club, swam the 220-yard dash in 2:32.2-5. This also was said to be a new national record for the distance.

Officials of the meet asserted that the world's record of 4:04 had been broken by the Illinois Athletic Club team, which won the 400-yard relay race in 3:57.1-5. The I. A. C. team was composed of Harry Hebler, Perry McGilivray, Arthur Rathel and John Mott. The Illinois Athletic Club won the meet with 97 points.

NEW HANDICAP RULE STOPS FAST HORSES

Special to The Telegraph Detroit, Mich., Aug. 1.—A new system of handicapping was tried yesterday for the first time, in the free-for-all trot, the last event of the week of grand circuit racing at the State fair grounds. Beginning at the first turn, chalked lines were laid down the track as far as the quarter-mile post.

In the scoring for each heat, the four starters were given positions off the pole, according to their last year's records, and each horse had to keep in its own lane until the chalk mark ended.

This arrangement forced Dudie Archdale, on the outside, to travel about fifty yards further than Robert Milrol, on the pole, and Anvil about thirty yards further, to complete the mile. Bon Zoelock was in second position.

BAN JOHNSON SUSPENDS TWO ROWDY PLAYERS

Special to The Telegraph Detroit, Mich., Aug. 1.—Ban Johnson, president of the American League, who is here investigating the disturbance Thursday when Umpire Sheridan ruled against Washington on a close decision at first base in the ninth inning of the Detroit-Washington game, has announced the suspension of Players Ainsmith and Morgan, of the Washington team.

"From what I have learned Ainsmith's action was cowardly and uncalled for and Morgan addressed Sheridan in profane terms immediately after the rendering of the decision," said Johnson. "The players have been suspended, but I do not know as yet the length of their suspension or the amount of their fines."

Ainsmith is said to have struck Sheridan after the latter's altercation with Morgan, who was called out at first base. Other players and spectators joined in the argument and eventually police had to be called to stop the fighting.

COME FORTH, JACK JOHNSON

Chicago, Aug. 1.—Jack Johnson, colored heavyweight champion, convicted of having violated the Mann white slave act, must appear in the Federal court here next Friday or his appeal bond of \$15,000 will be ordered forfeited.

NEW CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES

Johnson left for France soon after his conviction. The Circuit Court of Appeals has ordered that he be given a new trial on certain counts of the indictment and be resentenced on the points on which he was found guilty. He already has forfeited one bond of \$30,000.

The city of Scranton, by its council, petitions the commission for the construction of a union station in Scranton by the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey; the New York, Ontario and Western; the Delaware and Hudson; the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western, and the Erie Railroad Companies.

The Central Railroad of New Jersey is about to let a contract for a station for the use of itself and the New York, Ontario and Western, but has refused to enter into any negotiations which would include the other railroads mentioned.

The petition says that a union station would furnish adequate and sufficient facilities for the carrying on of the business of all of the companies with due regard to the convenience of the traveling public.

Next to the New York man are Cobb, Detroit, .342; Baker, Philadelphia, .341; Jackson, Cleveland, .339; Collins, Philadelphia, .327; Crawford, Brooklyn, .329; Byrne, Philadelphia, .321; Walker, St. Louis, .319; Speaker, Boston, .319; Fournier, Chicago, .317; Collins leads in stolen bases with 36.

In club batting Philadelphia with 365 and Washington with 248, lead. Top notchers among the pitchers include Leonard, Boston with 14 victories and three defeats; Bender, Philadelphia, with 9 and 2; Plank, Philadelphia with 11 and 2.
