COME IN AND RUMMAGE AROUND

FRENCH VICTORS IN BLOODY ENGAGEMENT

Machine Guns Mow Down Advance Forces of German Army at Petit Croix

Paris, Aug. 4.—French arms have scored a victory in a sharp and bloody engagement at Petit Croix. A corps of Uhlans attacked the French forces entrenched just beyond the town. The defenders replied with

machine guns and mowed down the advance guard of the Germans. The Uhlans charged several times, but were unable to withstand the withering fire of the defenders and finally retired in disorder, leaving a number of dead on the field. Among the wounded were some officers. The French also took a number of prisoners. The scene of the fight is a customs post on the Lorraine frontier. The Uhlans participating in the attack comprised the advance guard of the German army that was advancing from Metz with Nancy as the objective. News that they were enroute had been brought to the commander of the French customs guard by an aviator, who reconnoitered from the outposts late yesterday. The French plan of action was carefully outlined. Reinforcements, armed with machine guns, were sent to a point several miles inside of the frontier boundary. The customs guard remained at its post, with orders to act

on the defensive and retire in the presence of superior force. **Engage Frontier Guard** The Uhlans engaged the frontier guard which after an exchange of shots gave way, falling back on the main column, which in the meantime had been entrenched along the road in V-shape formation. The Uhlans, confident because of the trifling resistance encountered, charged at top speed. The French fire was withheld until the Germans were well within range and then the murderous machine guns cut loose. The front rank of Uhlans withered, but there was no halt in the charge. The French defenders poured a heavy rifle fire into the charging men, aiming at the horses, some of which fell and threw the whole column into confusion. The fire was so deadly that the German commander ordered a retreat, but quickly reformed his force outside of cannon range and later made a second assault. Like the former it failed and fully one-fourth of the attacking force was either killed, wounded or captured. Among the prisoners are said to be a number of officers. News of this first victory to the French army was quickly circulated throughout the city. The streets were quickly filled with rejoicing men and women. **Processions Formed** Impromptu processions, with French, English and Russian colors entwined, formed in the streets. The crowds marched to and fro singing patriotic measures and afterward visited the homes of the members of the Cabinet to cheer them. News of further fighting is expected momentarily. French aviators operating from Nancy have mapped the entire German advance in front of Longwy. Infantry and artillery are being hurried forward from Nancy to the aid of the Longwy garrison. It is the intention of France to assume the initiative here and to drive back the invaders by sheer force. The aviator corps will have its first real test there. Already it has covered itself with glory, one French aviator having flown over the German lines early yesterday and dropped bombs in the camp, demolishing the locomotive of an armored train and killing the officer in command and half a dozen of his men.

Presbyterians Make Advance During Year

New York, Aug. 4.—According to data just compiled, the northern Presbyterian Church has 1,458,000 members, an increase of 42,200 last year, or 140,000 since 1909. The converts last year numbered 93,400. Ministers and elders keep pace with this steady growth and Presbyterian churches now exceed 10,100 in number. Sunday School membership is 1,138,000. Presbyterian finances show similar advances. Money gifts last year totaled \$27,681,000, the largest in the history of the church. There has been an average annual increase of \$1,000,000 since 1909. The Congregational Church reports more than 750,000 members. This is a gain of almost 100,000 in the past ten years.

Waynesboro Shop Excursion Will Come to Harrisburg

Waynesboro, Pa., Aug. 4.—The shop committee on excursion has decided to run excursions to Harrisburg and Baltimore, the same as in former years. The Western Maryland Railroad Company will run the excursions at the same rate as last year, which was \$1.15 to Baltimore; \$1.35 to Tochester and \$2.00 to Washington. The rate over the Cumberland Valley railroad will be 75 cents for the round trip to Harrisburg. This is the largest excursion that leaves Waynesboro during the year.

Waynesboro, Pa., Aug. 4.—Adam Kope, of Marysville, and Miss Annie Myrtle Vogle, of Waynesboro, were married at the Quincy United Brethren Orphanage by the Rev. H. J. Kitzmiller on Saturday.

REUNION OF VETERANS

Mifflinburg, Pa., Aug. 4.—Civil War veterans of Mifflinburg and vicinity, including seven counties, will gather at Edgewood Park, Shamokin, on Wednesday, August 12. It is termed the annual reunion of Eight-County Veterans' Association and it will be one of the largest attended and most successful meetings in the history of the war veterans' organization.

Farmer Killed by Being Thrown Under Mower Wheels

Hummelstown, Pa., Aug. 4.—Thrown from the back of a mule, Elias Kreiser, 66 years old, who lived about two miles south of Hummelstown, fell beneath the wheels of a mowing machine and was crushed to death yesterday. Nearly every bone in the farmer's body was broken. Kreiser was mowing a field and when he was about half through with the job the mule balked and refused to go further. After trying in vain to drive the stubborn animal Kreiser crawled upon its back. Instantly the mule bolted and threw him to the ground. The animal then dashed up the field and pulled the mower, which weighed about 1,300 pounds, over Kreiser's body.

HORSE KILLED BY LIGHTNING

Waynesboro, Pa., Aug. 4.—During a recent severe electrical storm a horse belonging to Frank T. Helm, residing near Waynesboro, was struck by lightning and killed.
