3304 Girls' Norfolk Coat, 10 to 14 years.

Norfolk coats are always becoming to school girls and this one is unusually smart, showing as it does the new ripple effect below the belt. In the picture, it is made of eponge, but the model is a good one for any cloaking material. For immediate wear, the eponge is exceedingly beautiful; for occasions that require greater warmth, wool cloaking will be preferred and Scotch-tweed is a pronounced favorite. The upper edge of the box plaited portion is joined to the yoke and the lower edge to the circular peplum. The sleeves are the regulation two-piece sort. The belt is simply arranged over the coat so that one of leather can be used if liked.

For the 12 year size, the coat will require 4 yds. of material 27, 2 3/4 yds. 36, 2 1/2 yds. 44 in. wide.
