Saturday's Game Came Nearly Slipping From Joe Chabek; Fast Fielding


Harrisburg turned the tables on Lancaster on Saturday, winning the game by a timely rally in the eighth; score, 4 to 3.

Small Detachments of Germans Said to Have Passed Between Forts

Brussels, via London, 3.20 A. M., Aug. 10.—The newspaper Le Soir gives the following details of the German occupation at Liege.

The Germans on seeing spaces between the forts open before them, entered in small groups on Thursday evening. Among those who entered were General Von Emmich, commander of the Tenth Army Corps and his staff.

At the citadel, which is the barracks, the governor and the burgo-master of Liege were informed that unless the town and forts surrendered the Germans would bombard the town and raze it completely.

On Friday night seventeen notables of Liege headed by the bishop, burgo-master and sheriff, with some deputies proceeded to the citadel and begged General Von Emmich not to bombard the town.

The general replied that the town and forts must surrender or he would begin the bombardment. The Germans asserted that the peasants in the district had committed hostile acts against them.

All the members of the deputation were detained as hostages and it is not yet known whether they have since been liberated.

Reserve Board Members Take Oath of Office

Washington, Aug. 10.—The five members of the Federal Reserve Board which will control the new federal banking system took the oath of office to-day and began completing the steps preliminary to the actual opening of the new system to business.

Charles S. Hamlin, E. A. Delano, W. P. G. Harding, Paul M. Warburg and Adolph C. Miller, received their commissions, signed by President Wilson from Secretary McAdoo in his office where the ceremony took place.

Hamlin is governor and Mr. Delano is vice-governor. The first formal meeting will be held next Thursday.

The taking of office by the board was the last step in the preliminary stage of launching a completely new banking system for this country, the subject of consideration in congress for many years.

Workmen Who Fired on Troops Shot to Death

Brussels, Aug. 10.—No big engagement between the allied armies and the German troops is expected on Belgium until the French and Belgian combined forces take the offensive.

It is asserted here that after 200 German soldiers occupying a farm at Soiron near Pepinster in the province of Liege had been fired on by three workmen the village was given out to pillage by the German troops and the three workmen were taken out and shot by a firing squad.

Hardscrabble Measure to Come Up Tomorrow

With three important ordinances on the calendar, councilmen took for a busy session to-morrow afternoon. One of the measures which will come up for final consideration is the "Hardscrabble" ordinance.

This measure provides for the opening of Front street from Herr street to Calder street for park purposes. It is understood that an effort will be made to have this measure put over until a later date.

MAY HAVE RACE WITH CUP DEFENDERS

London, Aug. 10.—The Royal Ulster Yacht Club last Friday sent cable dispatch to the New York Yacht Club saying it would be glad if a postponement of one month could be granted for the America's cup races.

The message said that in the event of the war still being in progress at the expiration of that time the Royal Ulster Yacht Club would like to have the postponement extended so the races could be sailed in 1915 between the existing challenger and one of the present American candidates for the honor of defending the cup.

This message was in response to one received Thursday from the New York Yacht Club, in which it was stated that the New York Club regretted to learn that England was at war and would be glad to know the challengers' wishes regarding the matches.

LIPTON YACHT AT BERMUDAS: Hamilton, Bermuda, Aug. 10.—The Shamrock IV and the tender Erin have just arrived at St. George, east of Bermuda.

The Shamrock was a thousand miles on Bermuda when she received instructions to alter her course and sail for Bermuda. She sailed from Faval on July 29. The voyage was uneventful and the weather fair.

The yacht behaved splendidly at sea. Her crew who are well and know that the race had been canceled until they altered their course. They will wait here for instructions. The Shamrock is anchored in Saint Georges Harbor. The Erin comes to Hamilton at daybreak to-morrow.
