President Graham Is Here; Says Crowd Was in Wrong

League Leader Explains the Rule and William S. Tunis Gives His Side of the Story

Soon after the outbreak at Island Park yesterday afternoon, George Graham, president of the Tri-State League, arrived on the scene. The league leader was surprised at the action of the fans and said: "Such behavior is uncalled for baseball, fans know what the rules are governing rain checks. The Tri-State does what other leagues do in case of rain. One body fixes rules governing games as far as records are concerned; and the league bodies fix rain checks and other privileges. Rule 42 of the Tri-State says: 'In the event of a game being stopped for any reason before completion of four innings, the home club shall issue rain checks good for the next day only.' That is the rule. Those who started the trouble should be punished."
