

PEOPLE SHOCKED IN ELECTRICAL STORM Current Follows Water Pipes and Wires Into Houses in Lancaster County

Marietta, Pa., Aug. 14.—This section of Lancaster county was again visited by a severe electrical and lightning storm, with considerable damage on Wednesday night and lightning struck several buildings at the White Swan Hotel. The proprietor, Mrs. Henrietta Reynolds, was standing beneath the electric fan when a bolt felled her. At the Rudisill homestead a bolt followed the water pipe and Mrs. Rudisill, 80 years old, was struck and her arms paralyzed for a time. Lightning struck the Lutheran Church at Mechanicsburg, Lancaster county, and some damage resulted. A number of men who were painting the edifice had narrow escapes. Omar Greiner, standing outside the doorway, was struck by a bolt and his body burned. He was stunned for a time. A bolt of lightning struck the rotary at Groffdale, on the Terre Hill and Lancaster trolley line and several armatures were ruined. Lightning struck the home of Isaac L. Rutt, at Paradise, and demolished the roof and damaged the roof. Some hail fell in East Donegal township, but did not injure the tobacco. Emanuel Keneagy was stunned while sitting in the Farmers' Association at Williamstown and was burned badly. The home of Amos Weaver, at Intercourse, was struck, the bolt following the telephone wires. Mrs. Weaver was stunned and is under the care of a physician. The trolley service in all sections was crippled for a time.

Regiments Annihilated by Big Surprise Attack

Milan, Aug. 14.—How 500 Cossacks annihilated two picked Austrian cavalry regiments from Lemberg is told graphically in a dispatch which reached the Corriere D'Italia by way of Trieste. Emboldened by the withdrawal of Russian forces to some 15 miles on their side of the frontier, cavalry from Lemberg made a forward dash as far as Bielgaraj. No sooner did the Russian Governor of Halbin get wind of the invaders' rally than he rapidly collected a horde of Cossacks and put himself at the head of this force. Supported by field artillery, they moved in the dense forest skirting the main road for a couple of miles outside of town and then set about the preparations of the ambuscade for the enemy. Owing to the heavy rains the consequent overflow of the River Weepz, a tributary on which Bielgaraj stands, the whole country was converted into a vast swamp. Toward evening the Austrians had to pass this spot on their way back to headquarters from their predatory excursion. Their advance guard trotted tranquilly past, for none of the Cossacks could be seen. Only a few peasants, toiling here and there in the fields, were visible. All of a sudden the main body of cavalry feroceously onslaugth, both front and rear. Not a single Austrian escaped to tell the tale.

Dearth, Not War, Sends Up Prices, Says Armour

Chicago, Aug. 14.—Vigorous denial that packers have made the European war an excuse to put up meat prices was made to-day by J. Ogden Armour, president of Armour and Co., in a statement. He said that the reason for the advances was that receipts at the stockyards here for the last two weeks have been approaching a "famine" basis. In that statement explained, Armour & Co., have killed fewer hogs than during any similar period in the history of the concern. "The nine Armour plants killed only 14,738 hogs last week, against 70,338 the week before the war," the statement read. "They killed only 17,512 cattle last week, against 21,836 the week before the war, and only 20,334 sheep last week, against 46,395 the week before the war." Mr. Armour said the packers have contended with a shortage of live stock for a year, and lately with the natural tendency of the producer to hold back his stock in hopes of wartime prices.

George Warns Subjects Against Traitorous Acts

Special to The Telegraph. Philadelphia, Aug. 14.—Two important Royal proclamations issued by King George were received by Sir Wilfred Powell, at the British consulate yesterday. One proclamation announced the articles Great Britain would regard as contraband of war in her war with Germany. The other was a warning that the King would regard as traitors all subjects who contributed to, or assisted in the floating of any loan by the German government during the continuation of the war. The articles regarded as contraband of war were named under two schedules. The first schedule specified the articles looked up as absolute contraband and referred to materials having direct application to naval or military armaments. The second schedule named articles that will be treated as conditional contraband or those that are fit for but not necessarily having direct application to hostile uses. In both classifications the subjects of neutral powers are forbidden to supply the articles named to nations at war with Great Britain.

NEW FOUNDLAND AIDS BRITAIN

St. John's, N. F., Aug. 14.—New Foundland will contribute to Great Britain's force 500 men, fully equipped for land service; will increase the naval reserve from 600 to 1,000 and will enlist an auxiliary force of 500 men for defense of this island colony. Action to this effect was taken to-night at a great public meeting at which enthusiasm ran high. Governor Walter Davidson presided.

KAISER NOT GOING TO AIX

London, Aug. 14.—A dispatch received here to-day from Rome says that Emperor William, who, it was reported, intended making a visit to Aix la Chapelle, has been persuaded not to make the journey. Aix la Chapelle is near the Belgian frontier.
