4,500 Americans Leave Liverpool For New York

London, Aug. 15, 12:10 P. M.—The departure of 4,500 Americans from Liverpool to-day was followed by 1,000 from Glasgow. The carrying capacity of the vessels sailing for trans-Atlantic ports during the next twenty-five days is estimated at 60,000, or about the number of Americans in the British Isles. While the number on the continent of Europe is not known, it is believed not to exceed 30,000.

Russian Victory Over Austrians Is Confirmed

London, Aug. 15, 11:30 A. M.—The French Minister of Foreign Affairs in a telegram to the French embassy here to-day, a summary of the various conflicts about which reports already have been published gives official confirmation of a Russian victory over the Austrians on the river Dniester.
