French and Austrian Warships in Battle
London, Aug. 17, 6:40 A. M.—A dispatch to Reuters Telegraph Company from Nish, Serbia, under date of Sunday, says:
A naval battle between French and Austrian warships begun off Budua, Austria, in the Adriatic at 9 o'clock this morning. The French squadron, coming from the southwest attacked the Austrian warships. Two Austrian ironclads were sunk, one was set on fire and a fourth fled northwards toward Cattaro. The fight lasted over an hour.
