Wilson Will Suspend Ship Registry Rules

Windsor, Vt., Sept. 1.—President Wilson virtually has decided the ship registry question while here on his vacation. Soon after his return to Washington he will issue an executive order suspending for a stated period, probably three years, the provisions of the navigation laws requiring vessels flying the American flag to have masters and crews who are American citizens and to be measured by American officials.

German Spies Placed in Prison in Paris

Paris, Sept. 1, 3:30 a. m.—Three German spies were brought from Evreux, south of Amiens, last night by a squad of French troops. They were arrested in the French lines and one of them wore the uniform of a Belgian officer. The soldiers had difficulty in protecting them from a mob.

Japanese Occupy Two More German Islands

Peking, Sept. 1.—The Japanese, according to reports received here, have occupied two other islands within the German sphere at Kiao Chow. These are Taliekao and Tekung-Tao. These islands had not been occupied by the Germans. Information received yesterday was to the effect that the Japanese had occupied Ta-Chien, a small island outside of Kiao Chow bay.

Balkan States May Unite Against Turks

Sofia, Sept. 1.—If Turkey decides to aid the German-Austrian cause by an onslaught upon the Balkan states, Greece, Rumania, Serbia, Montenegro and Bulgaria are pledged to join in a fight against Turkey.

New York Is Ready to Pay \$12,000,000 Abroad

New York, Sept. 1.—It was announced yesterday, after several conferences of bankers, that the September obligations of New York city, falling due in France and England and totaling between \$12,000,000 and \$15,000,000, would be met.

GARRANZA CLOSES PORT OF VERA CRUZ

\$3,000,000 INCREASE FOR MAIL SERVICE

Joint Congressional Committee Reports and Criticizes Post Office Department

Washington, Sept. 1.—The Joint Congressional Committee on Railway Mail Pay to-day made its final report recommending increases in mail pay that are expected to mean an additional annual compensation to the railroads of about \$3,000,000 as compared with the provisions report recommends for the present fiscal year.
