reaches the enemy's lines and the message reveals the fact the orders have been sold. Van Houver is relieved of his command and imprisoned as a traitor. His wife appears before the court with Spinelli's cloak to prove that he stole the sealed orders. But Van Houver acknowledges the cloak as his own and he is sentenced to be shot.
