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FAST HORSE RACES AT PORT ROYAL FAIR

Big Crowds Will Witness Good Trotting Contests Scheduled For Thursday and Friday

Port Royal, Pa., Sept. 10.—Thousands of visitors crowded the grounds at the Juniata county fair at Port Royal yesterday. Early in the morning trains from all directions were crowded with young and old and the public roads were lined with automobiles and buggies, all going to the fair. The attendance was a record-breaker and everybody was out for a full day of enjoyment.

A Hungarian aviator made an exhibition flight, working against heavy winds. He covered a distance of thirteen miles in fifteen minutes and made a splendid landing at the end of the flight.

Professor Haldeman Von Figgelmevy, the high dive bicycle expert, made a remarkable dive from a platform eighty-five feet in the air, landing in a tank of water.

SIR JOHN FRENCH TELLS OF MOVEMENT

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Pushed His Flank Back The commander of the First Corps had pushed his flank back to some high ground south of Bray and the Fifth Cavalry evacuated Binche, moving slightly south. The enemy thereupon occupied Binche.

The right of the Third Division, under General Hamilton, was at Mons, which formed a somewhat dangerous salient and I directed the commander of the Second Corps if threatened seriously to draw back the center behind Mons. This was done before dark.

In the meantime, about 5 in the afternoon, I received a most unexpected message from General Joffre by telegraph, telling me that at least three German corps were moving on my position in front and that a second corps was engaged in a turning movement from the direction of Tournai. He also informed me that the 9th reserve French divisions and the Fifth French Army Corps on my right were retiring, the Germans having on the previous day gained possession of the passage of the Sambre between Charleroi and Namur.

In view of the possibility of my being driven from the Mons position,

I had previously ordered a position in the rear to be reconnoitered. This position rested on the fortress of Maubeuge on the right and extended west to Jenlain, southeast of Valenciennes on the left. The position was reported difficult to hold because standing crops and buildings made the sightings trenches very difficult and limited the fire of the important localities. It nevertheless afforded a few good artillery positions.

Fighting on Whole Line When the news of the retirement of the French and the heavy German retreat on my front reached me, I endeavored to confirm it by aeroplane reconnaissance and as a result of this I determined to effect a retirement to the Maubeuge position at day-break on the 24th.

A certain amount of fighting continued along the whole line throughout the night and at daybreak on the 24th the Second and Third Divisions in the neighborhood of Harmignies made a powerful demonstration as if to retake Binche. This was supported by the artillery of both the First and the Second Division, while the First Division took up a supporting position in the neighborhood of Peixants. Under cover of this demonstration the Second Corps retired on the line of Dour, Quoroule and Frameries. The Third Division on the right of the Second Corps suffered considerable loss in this operation from the enemy, who had retaken Mons.

The Second Corps halted on this line, where they entrenched themselves, enabling Sir Douglas Haig, with the First Corps, to draw to the new position, and he effected this without much further loss, reaching the line from Bavay to Maubeuge about 7 in the evening.

Attack Directed at Left Towards midnight the enemy appeared to be directing his principal effort against our left. I had previously ordered General Allenby with the cavalry to vigorously attack in advance of my front and endeavor to take the pressure off.

About 7.30 in the morning General Allenby received a message from Sir Charles Fergusson, commanding the Fifth Division, saying he was very hard pressed and in urgent need of support. On receipt of this message, General Allenby drew in his cavalry and endeavored to bring direct support to the Fifth Division.

During the course of this operation General Drenth of the Second Cavalry Brigade, thought he saw a good opportunity to paralyze the further advance of enemy's infantry by making a mounted attack on his flank. He formed up and advanced for this purpose, but was held up by wire about 500 yards from his objective and the Ninth Lancers and the Eighteenth Hussars suffered severely in the retirement of the brigade.

Great Losses Suffered The Nineteenth Infantry Brigade, which had been guarding the line of communication, was brought by rail to Valenciennes on the 22nd and 23rd. On the morning of the 24th they were moved out to a position south of Quoroule to the flank of the Second Corps. With the assistance of cavalry Sir Horace Smith Dorrien was enabled to effect his retreat to a new position, although having two corps of the enemy on his front and one threatening his flank. He suffered great losses in doing so.

At nightfall a position was occupied by the Second Corps to the west of Bavay, the First Corps to the right. The right was protected by the fortress of Maubeuge, the left by the Nineteenth Brigade in position between Jenlay and Bruay, and cavalry on the outer flank. The French were still retiring and I had no support except such as was afforded by the fortress of Maubeuge, and determined efforts of the enemy to get around my flank assured me that it was his intention to attack that place and surround me. I felt that not a moment must be lost in returning to another position. I had every reason to believe that the enemy's forces were some what exhausted and I knew that they had suffered heavy losses. I hoped therefore that his pursuit would not be too vigorous to prevent me effecting my object. The operation, however, was full of danger and difficulty, not only owing to the very superior forces in my front, but also to the exhaustion of my troops.

The retirement was recommenced in the early morning of the 25th to a position in the neighborhood of Leateau, and the rear guard was ordered to be clear of Maubeuge and Bavay by 5.30 a. m.

Although the troops had been ordered to occupy the Cambrat-le-Cateau-Landreules position, and ground had during the 25th, been partially prepared and entrenched, I had grave doubts, owing to information I had received as to the accumulating strength of the enemy against me, as to the wisdom of standing there to

fight.

Having regard to the continued retirement of the French right, my exposed left flank, the tendency of the enemy's western corps to envelop me, and more than all, the exhausted condition of the troops, I determined to make a great effort to continue the retreat till I could put some substantial obstacle, such as the Somme or the Oise between my troops and the enemy and afford the former some protection.

Retreat Continued Orders were therefore sent to the corps commanders to continue their retreat as soon as they possible could. The enemy, however, would not allow them this rest and about 9.30 the evening of August 25 the report was received that the Fourth Guards Brigade in Landreules was heavily attacked by troops of the Ninth German Army Corps, who were coming through the forest to the north of the town. This brigade fought most gallantly and caused the enemy to suffer a tremendous loss in issuing from the forest into the narrow streets of the town. This loss has been estimated from reliable sources at between 700 and 1,000.

At the same time information reached me from Sir Douglas Haig that his First Division was also heavily engaged south and east of Marais. I sent urgent messages to the commanders of two French reserve divisions on my right to come up to the assistance of the First Corps, which they eventually did. Partly owing to their assistance, but mainly to the skillful manner in which Sir Douglas Haig extricated
