20,000 VISITORS SEE AVIATOR FALL

Hungarian Flyer at Port Royal Fair Breaks Leg to Save Spectators

PRIZES AWARDED YESTERDAY
Hundreds Registered at Headquarters of Harrisburg Telegraph on Fair Grounds

Port Royal, Pa., Sept. 11.—Twenty thousand visitors attended the Port Royal Fair yesterday, the largest number on record. Special trains were run from Harrisburg and Lewistown and the day was a great success, with the exception of the aeroplane accident.

The Hungarian aviator, Baronette Haldeman von Fyglemessy, made a flight at 2 o'clock, staying up in the air twenty minutes and covering a distance of twelve miles. The accident occurred while making a landing on the fair grounds. He circled over the immense crowd, turning the aeroplane downward, but failed to shut off the engine in time. Striking the ground with terrific force, the aeroplane pounced up and ran for quite a distance, coming in contact with a tree, smashing the side of the aeroplane. The aviator had a leg broken above the knee and his back bruised. He was taken to the Lewistown Hospital for treatment. On account of the aeroplane being damaged, there will be no flight to-day.



London, Sept. 11, 2.03 a. m.—"The first official admission on the German side of success by the allies," says a Central News dispatch from Amsterdam, "appears in official communications issued in Berlin. General Von Stein announces that the German army, which had advanced across the Marne to the east of Paris, was heavily attacked by the enemy between Paris, Beaux and Montmarail. The fighting lasted two days. The German army had checked the enemy and had even itself advanced, but the stronger hostiles came to the assistance of the allies and the enemy won
