PENROSE FLAYS MITCHELL PALMER

Declares That He Betrayed His State When He Drafted the Metal Schedule of 1913

Congressman A. Mitchell Palmer's action in drawing the metal schedule of the present tariff law was last night declared to have been conduct traitorous to the wage-earners of his native state by Senator Boies Penrose in a statement issued at Philadelphia. The statement was accompanied by a criticism of the failure of the national administration to properly care for the Americans caught in the war zone and a denunciation of the Wilson policy of putting Democratic spoils men in the places of men who have served for years abroad as national representatives and whose services are

needed now more than ever. Palmer was contrasted with Samuel J. Randall, who, although a Democrat, protected the industries of his state and rose to be speaker of the national house. In his remarks Senator Penrose said: "Mr. Palmer's statement about the Republican candidates, including myself, are garbled, insincere and intentionally misleading. They are scarcely worthy of being dignified by any notice from me. The small size of the meetings which listen to him is the best evidence of how little interest the public is taking in his utterances. "Mr. Palmer is admitted to be the author of the metal schedule in the Underwood-Palmer tariff law. He had full charge of this schedule in the House of Representatives. Why does he not defend and explain the metal schedule to the people of Pennsylvania? He cannot explain it satisfactorily and it is incredible to me that he has the effrontery to go into any town where there is a furnace or a metal establishment to be found. "As a result of the Palmer metal schedule several hundred thousand men have been thrown out of work in Pennsylvania, while thousands of others are working on half time. Simi-

lar conditions exist in all the other industries of Pennsylvania affected by the Palmer-Underwood tariff law. In other words, Palmer has been a traitor to Pennsylvania industries and interests. "What a contrast between his course and that of Samuel J. Randall, the great leader of Democracy twenty years ago, who, while a Democrat, aided as far as possible to protect Pennsylvania industries while tariff bills were under consideration. Of course Palmer cannot defend his action as a Benedict Arnold of Pennsylvania and he has to resort to misrepresentation and abuse. "It might be well also for Mr. Palmer to explain to the people of the State how the civil service laws of the government have been violated and prostituted for partisan purposes. All the positions under the collectors of internal revenue have been taken out of civil service; postmasters have been removed upon trivial and trumped-up charges before the expiration of their four-year tenure of office; postoffices have been bartered and sold and federal officials of all kinds have been assessed and blackmailed for political purposes, even within the precincts of federal buildings in violation of the criminal statutes of Congress.
