SEPTEMBER BIG BUILDING MONTH

Permits Are Issued to Value of \$105,450—Fall Record Since 1912

Harrisburg enjoyed a real building boom during September—a boom for the early fall month at any rate. Figures compiled to-day following the issue of the last permit showed that twenty-four permits had been issued at an approximate cost of \$105,450.

As compared with September of last year this is unusually large. September of 1913 produced thirty-seven permits at a cost of \$83,800. In 1912 there were thirty-five permits issued at an approximate cost of \$101,050 and in 1911 there were twenty permits, totaling \$80,975 in cost.
