



BOMBS DAMAGE NEW YORK CATHEDRAL AND RECTORY; PRIEST HURT

Police Believe Work Was Done by Same Person or Persons; Motive a Mystery

AUTHORITIES INVESTIGATING

Boy Praying in Church, Thirty Feet Away From Bomb, Sustained Injuries

New York, Oct. 14.—From bits of iron picked up in both St. Patrick's Cathedral and in the yard of St. Alphonsus rectory in West Broadway, the police believe that the bombs exploded yesterday afternoon and early today at the two edifices were the work of the same person or persons.

ARIZONA GOVERNOR WANTS TO SEND HIS MILITIA TO BORDER

London, Oct. 14, 3.25 A. M.—"The captain of an American schooner which was permitted to pass Antwerp to-day," says the Daily Express' Rotterdam correspondent in a dispatch filed Monday, "states that the German camps extend in a semicircle four miles wide and twenty miles in extent between the inner and outer fortifications."
