INCREASED RATES FOR BAGGAGE STORAGE

New Charges Now in Effect on All Railroads in the East

Railroad patrons in Harrisburg and vicinity received notice to-day of a change in time limit on storage bag-gage. Storage charges will be colected in the future on baggage left more than twenty-four hours according to the rates of the company.

The substance of the old baggage ruling was as follows: Articles received between the hours of noon Saturday and noon Sunday were held without additional charge until noon Monday. The rule also applied to legal holidays. The new table of storage charges for baggage of the Pennsylvania Railroad is as follows: For twenty-four hours or less, after the result free period, is 10 cents; for each additional twenty-four hours or less, 10 cents; maximum charge for month, \$1; each subsequent day or fraction thereof after one month, 10 cents; maximum charge for month, \$2.

With the filing of tariffs for the storage of baggage another courtesy is lost to railroad men.
