**TORN AMERICAN FLAG REPLACED BY GERMANS**

London, Nov. 19.—A Belgian refugee who has arrived from Antwerp tells of alleged anti-American feeling among German soldiers there. He says:  
"I believe some day there will be trouble between the Germans and Americans. I heard that German soldiers tore down an American flag from an office of the Red Star Line, where some American goods were stored. They tore it in half and destroyed it."  
"The American Consul came and demanded the flag, and when the Germans could not produce it, the Consul demanded that they buy a new one. When this was done he hoisted it and tore down the German flag, treating it the same way his own flag had been treated."
