PUBLIC SERVICE IS TAKING NOTICE

Hearing Will Be Held in Philadelphia to Outline the Procedure

It is evidently not determined as to the manner in which the Public Service Commission will handle the complaints affecting the proposed increase in passenger fares, but the probability is that a conclusion will be reached when the commission meets in Philadelphia on Friday.
It is contended by many who are familiar with the provisions of the public service company law, that the commission has the authority to prevent a proposed change of rate from going into effect until it has had sufficient time to conduct a public hearing and reach a correct conclusion. It is pointed out that there is a fundamental distinction between the suspension of a rate already in existence and which would leave a vacancy and the temporary refusal to permit a perhaps unlawful rate from going into effect until the question may be determined, and which leaves the old rate in existence.
The advocates who contend that the commission may issue an order that the rate be not permitted to go into effect until the commission determines its validity claim that if it is found to be illegal to issue such an order, the act creating the commission ought to be amended so as to make provision for such cases.
W. B. Brown, of Reading, who is a traveling man, protests against the increased rates and predicts that the commercial traveler will soon become extinct, for the expenses are higher than the average firm can afford to pay.
