NEWS OF THE RAILROADS

NO MORE FREE ROOMS FOR LOCAL TRAINMEN

With Increase in Pay For Layoffs, Privileges in Altoona Are Cut Out

Passenger trainmen from Harrisburg and Pittsburgh, who have long layoffs in Altoona, have been scanning the "rooms for rent columns" recently. Orders were issued last week by N. A. Smith, superintendent of the middle division of the Pennsylvania railroad, cutting out free room privileges at the Logan House during their stay in Altoona.

In his order, Superintendent Smith calls attention to the recent concession granted the trainmen, in giving them full pay for the time they remain in Altoona and expresses his belief that the men should pay their own room rent. Heretofore trainmen from the Pittsburgh and middle divisions have had from twelve to twenty-four hours in Altoona without any pay. On some runs Harrisburg and Pittsburgh men are obliged to spend the best part of the week in Altoona, being at their homes only between trains. Increased pay allowed, it is contended, will more than cover the expense of a room.



OFFICIAL NOTES SETTLED AT LAST

Allegheny County Figures Are Presented and New Totals Are Made Up at Capitol



Revised official figures from Allegheny county reached the Department of the Secretary of the Commonwealth today and the official publication of the result of the election will be reprinted and show the correct vote of the State for Senator and Governor.

According to these late official figures more votes were cast for Governor than anything else, the revised total being 1,112,207 against 1,111,788 polled in the senatorial contest. The vote for Governor is over 100,000 less than polled in the Presidential campaign in this State in 1912, when a total of 1,217,736 was reached. In the 1910 gubernatorial campaign the total vote for Governor was 998,448.

The vote as announced is as follows: Senator—Palmer, D., 266,415; Palmer, scattering, 21; total, 266,436. Pinchot, W., 202,546; E. M., 48,875; R. P., 17,755; total, 269,176. Penrose, R., 499,336; P. L., 20,485; scattering, 9; total, 519,830. Grand total votes cast, including those for Socialist, Prohibitionist, etc., 1,111,788. Penrose plurality over Pinchot, 250,655; over Palmer, 253,934; Pinchot over Palmer, 2,739.

Governor—McCormick, D., 312,553; W., 140,329; total, 452,882. Brumbaugh, R., 534,898; K., 37,847; P. L., 17,956; total, 590,701. Total vote for Governor, including all others, 1,112,207; Brumbaugh's plurality over McCormick, 137,819; Brumbaugh's majority over all, 69,195.

NETS \$50 FROM A REQUEST OF \$500

Register Danner Dismisses Action to Prevent Probation of Martha Adams' Will



About fifty-nine dollars is the total sum which Mrs. Susannah Albright will receive from her share of a \$500 bequest from Mrs. Martha Adams as a result of the contest she instituted before Register of Wills Danner to prevent the probate of Mrs. Adams' will. The action to restrain the probate of the will was dismissed by Register Danner this morning in a brief opinion and the costs of the proceeding were placed upon the petitioner. The total costs amount to \$441.

The will case attracted widespread attention in view of the fact that Mrs. Albright and some other relatives of the dead woman protested against the probate of the will because they believed Mrs. Adams had been unduly influenced in the preparation of her last testament by Harrison Seifert, an alleged clairvoyant. Mr. Seifert, according to the allegations, had used mysterious "force" or "power" bags upon his "subject."

Nine Divorce Actions Begun.—Nine actions in divorce were begun in the Allegheny County Court today when the preliminary papers were taken out by Attorney E. E. Beideman. The charges include marital infidelity and desertion and the papers show that the couples have been wedded from periods varying from one to nearly fifteen years. STEELTON GOOD PLACE FOR DISTRIBUTION

Manufacturing Saves Money by Mailing Catalogs From Central Point

Attention has been called to Steelton's advantages as a distribution point by a large Indiana wholesale house. This firm, manufacturers of Masonic uniforms and emblems, shipped by freight last week 1,500 of its new catalogs to Joseph Bricker, its local agent. Bricker then mailed the catalogs by parcel post through the local post office to all parts of the Eastern United States. Steelton, it appears, is the exact center of a large area covering the eastern states and just reaching many of the big eastern cities in the parcel post zone. By this manner the company saved several hundred dollars in postage.

Postmaster M. M. Cusack has completed arrangements for the Christmas rush. Two extra wagons will be put in service next Monday to care for the increased parcel post business. No extra men will be employed, but the regular carriers will be allowed to work overtime.

Already one of the biggest rushes is over. During last week there were about 150 parcel post packages a day sent from the local office to Austria, with a few to Italy.

SERIOUS BLOW STRUCK COL. GOETHALS WANTS AT NAVY OF TURKEY CANAL ZONE POLICED

Torpedoing of Messudieh Most Reiterates His Request to Government For Two Torpedo-boat Destroyers

London, Dec. 14, 12.15 P. M.—The first serious blow inflicted on the Turkish navy since the entrance of the Porte into the war, the torpedoing of the Turkish battleship Messudieh by a British submarine in the Dardanelles, gave naval color to to-day's war news and was in fact the only striking occurrence chronicled by land or by sea.

Little or no change has been reported on the western battle front and in the east Russia and German continue to fight a seemingly endless battle for the control of Western Poland. English and French newspapers unite in declaring that the time is drawing near for the much discussed general advance of the allies through France and Belgium and some unofficial reports say this move is about to be undertaken if it has not actually begun. Progress necessarily would be inch by inch and even the most optimistic of the British observers, assuming that a general forward movement of the allies is to be essayed, concede that it would be Spring before any appreciable eastern progress could be made.

The feat of Lieutenant-Commander Holbrook in diving under five rows of mines in the Dardanelles and torpedoing the Turkish battleship is described here as perhaps the boldest marine exploit of the war. The submarine, presumably, was not scratched.

BATTERIES MOVE NORTH

Paris, Dec. 14.—The French official statement given out in Paris this afternoon reports comparative quiet in Flanders, and artillery exchanges of relatively minor importance elsewhere. In the Meuse German batteries are said to be moving to the north in the Woerth district. French captured a trench and repulsed two counter attacks. The advance of the French line into Alsace has brought it to a point north of Altkich and about ten miles to the east of the frontier.

RUSSIANS CLAIM SUCCESSES

Petrograd, Dec. 14, via London, 2.20 p. m.—Reports reaching here to-day from the front state that the operations of Russian forces north of Warsaw, partial success of which was announced last week, have now resulted in a decisive victory, after having pierced the German front beyond Cichanow and Przenyasz.

CHRISTIAN H. MYERS DIES

Mount Joy, Pa., Dec. 14.—Christian H. Myers, a prominent member of the Brethren in Christ denomination, died on Sunday at his residence, half a mile southwest of Mount Joy, aged 69 years.

GERMANY GETS LITTLE COTTON

Washington, D. C., Dec. 14.—Germany during the last four months received only 1,075 bales of American cotton, 1,090 of which were sent last month, as shown to-day by Census Bureau statistics. November's total cotton exports were slightly more than that for the same month a year ago, while the shipments abroad during the last four months showed a decrease of 2,801,000 bales.

REVERSES FOR TURKEY IN FIGHTING ON LAND

London, Dec. 14, 4.45 a. m.—A Petrograd dispatch in the Times says: "Advices from the front at Erzerum, Turkish Armenia, describe the position of 20,000 Christians there as precarious because of their Russian sympathies. Three hundred thousand Turkish troops are mobilized at Erzerum."

CHRISTIANS IN DANGER

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BRITISH LOSSES PUBLISHED

London, Dec. 3 (Correspondence of the Associated Press).—The official British casualty list for the week ending November 30 was made public today. Since the outbreak of hostilities Great Britain has had 966 officers killed and 1,918 wounded, while 582 officers and 1,918 men have died. The total of casualties of officers up to date is therefore 3,466.

RUSSIANS REPULSE ENEMY

Petrograd, via London, Dec. 14, 5.59 a. m.—An official communication issued by the Russian army staff of the Caucasus says that on Friday fighting occurred on the front extending through the villages of Pyrusok, Asmer and Tutak (southeast of Erzerum). The enemy was everywhere repulsed, and pushed beyond the Euphrates with severe losses.
