Resolved, That the following be and it is hereby ordained by the Burgess and Council of the Borough of Paxtang, and it is hereby ordained by authority of the same: Section 1. Any person who shall have shade or other trees growing upon or along any sidewalk in the Borough shall keep them pruned and trimmed so that no branches or limbs shall project over the sidewalk at a height of less than eight feet above the grade of the sidewalk.

Dullness Spread Over Trading Soon After Opening of Morning Session

New York, Dec. 21. — Shares of some of the leading Eastern railroads were heavy in to-day's early and narrow session of the stock market. The anthracite issues, namely, Reading and Lehigh Valley, were down 1 1/2 points, falling under last week's low prices presumably as a result of the sharp cut in coal rates ordered by the Pennsylvania Public Service Commission. Pennsylvania and Southern Pacific lost fractionally and Great Northern, East Timore and Ohio and United States Steel. Unimportant gains were made by General Electric and Republic Steel. Amalgamated Copper, which showed some strength at the outset, soon yielded and the whole market relapsed into dullness.
