MILES OF FILM STATE CENSORSHIP

Enough Film to Reach From Harrisburg to Winchester Gets the State Sanction

Just 6,116,000 feet, or about 116 miles, of film were approved by the Pennsylvania State Board of Censors during the period between June 1 and November 30, according to a report just made to the Governor by J. Louis Breitinger, chief censor.

On December 1 it became obligatory for all films in use to bear the State censor's mark, which consists of a wreath topped by the state seal, showing a keystone and bearing the approval statement. About forty exhibitors throughout the State have been arrested and fined \$50 each for exhibiting films which did not have state approval.

To include Quarries.—Recommendations for placing under authority of the State Department of Mines of all quarries, iron ore and other mines, oil and gas wells and other operations will be made to the next legislature in a report which will be drafted under authority of a legislative resolution passed in 1913.

Royer and his alert, capable corps of assistants are turning out from this cosmopolitan group of students, in the "English School" for foreign-speaking residents of Steelton.
