TENER DISMISSES THOSE "CHARGES"

Declines to Take Papers Sent by a Philadelphia Lawyer as Seriously as Desired

Governor John K. Tener last night dismissed the charges filed against the Public Service Commission by a Philadelphia lawyer in behalf of some organizations of business men and computerists, declaring that he had confidence in the commissioners and that there was nothing in the much heralded charges to warrant action against any member of the board.

The charges were disposed of after a conference with Deputy Attorney General J. E. B. Cunningham and a reply was dictated to the lawyer filing the papers. Then the Governor issued this statement: "I have read the charges and petition received today, and find nothing contained therein to convince me that the personnel of the commission should be changed. The Pennsylvania Public Service law is admittedly the best in the United States, and I have every confidence in those who have been appointed by me to carry out its provisions honestly and fearlessly."
