MUCH CARE SHOWN IN STEELTON FINANCES

Annual Report Shows Big Cash Balance; Pass Light Ordinance

Approve new five-year contract for street lighting. Ask traction company to pay cost of removing snow from streets. Approve annual financial statement. Give annual appropriations to fire companies and board of health. Establish new grade for Reading street, final. Appoint M. F. Harlan successor to Councilman Francis was. Introduce ordinance for paving Highland street, from Second to Third. Purchase 600 feet Paragon fire hose. Authorize acceptance of Baldwin hosehouse, when completed. Authorize placing new fire alarm whistle on pumping station. Give merited salary increase, \$5 monthly, to Assistant Borough Secretary Charles T. Lehr. Pay bills amounting to \$7,421.85.

That the borough of Steelton is in an excellent financial condition and has a tidy sum of money in its treasury, was shown in the annual statement of the finance committee to council last evening.

Although more public improvements, repairs to firehouses and streets were carried on during 1914, than in any previous year, the finance committee looked after its duties so well that more than \$5,000 was saved out of current revenues. On January 1, 1914, there was a cash balance in the treasury, according to the report, of \$8,086.91. On December 31 the cash balance had been increased to \$12,271.27. There is also an additional \$30,000 cash held in a local bank, on certificates of deposit. This money will be used for completing the municipal improvement plan.

A written report on the proposed street lighting changes was sent to council by President J. V. W. Reynolds, who is also chairman of the finance committee, to which committee the proposed changes were sent to council by President J. V. W. Recommend Light Contract
The chairman of the finance committee reported to council last evening that he had induced the light company to incorporate a clause in the contract providing if any reductions in the cost of street lighting are made to any municipality during the term of the contract, Steelton should also be given a reduction in rates. With this clause incorporated the committee recommended the contract.

After discussing the proposed changes and the new rates, which are cheaper than the old, council authorized the chairman of the finance committee to sign the proposed contract with the light company.

After a year's delay and repeated heated arguments among the councilmen, Wagonbaugh's snow ordinance was finally disposed of last evening when the borough solicitor was instructed to prepare a resolution recommending the fire company to bear half the cost of removing snow from the borough streets occupied by their tracks. A resolution was also passed asking the company to abate its snow pile nuisance.

Report of Burgess
Burgess Fred Wigfield read his annual report to council in which he recommended some reforms and improvement of the borough. The fire patrol as special police, the appointment of one additional patrolman and the fitting out of a detention cell for the use of the borough stocks, "conditions in the lockup, be assessed, unsanitary and inhumane, so far as the detention of women are concerned.

Appropriations to the fire companies for 1915 were made as follows: Citizen, \$295; Paxtang Hook and Ladder, \$290; West Side, \$240; Baldwin, \$280; Hygiene, \$200, and the East End company's expenses will be paid. The Board of Health received \$2,400 for its 1915 budget.

Buy New Hose
M. I. Crane, of the Eureka Fire Hose Company, was given an order for 600 feet of Paragon hose, the kind now used by the fire department, after a heated debate. The price was \$11.10 per foot.

A letter from the Swatara township commissioners in reference to the Mohr street fire was read. The commissioners have appointed a committee of two of their members to confer with Fire Chief John E. Shupp, Jr., and decide what Steelton should receive for losses sustained at this fire.

The borough inventory shows that property to the amount of \$331,054.56 is owned by the borough. Mr. Sellers presided in the absence of President J. V. W. Reynolds.

Berlin, Jan. 5, via The Hague and London, 10.20 a. m.—Emperor William has given orders that the so-called war bread be served to himself and the members of his entourage.

This bread, styled also "K" bread, consists of 55 per cent. of rye flour and 15 per cent. of potato flakes. It is being consumed in accordance with the idea of making the supply of foodstuffs in the empire last longer. Up to the present time it has not been bought readily by the general public. It is hoped, however, that the decision of the Emperor to eat this bread himself will influence the people to follow his example.
