PERRY COUNTY FAIR LOST MONEY IN 1914

Important Meeting of Agricultural Society Held at Newport on Wednesday

Newport, Pa., Jan. 8.—Stockholders of the Perry County Agricultural Society met here yesterday and transacted business pertaining to the association and elected officers. T. H. Bittorf was chosen president, J. C. F. Stephens secretary and J. E. Fleisher treasurer. The report of the officers was presented and it was shown that the receipts for the fair of 1914 were \$1,487.70 and the expenditures \$3,212.31, leaving a shortage of \$1,724.61. The appropriation for 1915 was \$1,100, making the actual loss for the exhibition, \$654.61. Clark M. Bower, chairman of farmers' institutes, made an address at the meeting.



Newport, Pa., Jan. 8.—At the ripe age of 84 years, Alfred Miller Gantt died at his home yesterday in West Newport of cancer and the infirmities of old age. Mr. Gantt was born near Middle Ridge Church and lived in this vicinity all his life. He received his education at the New Bloomfield Academy and at the age of 18 began to teach school and taught continuously for a period of forty-five years. Mr. Gantt assisted in laying the first tracks of railroads that go through the borough and was also employed by the contractors who ran the new line through here a number of years ago. He was a member of the Pennsylvania Railroad Veterans' Association. Mr. Gantt married Miss Martha Ann English, who died eleven years ago. He is survived by two children, Mrs. Flora I. Middleton and Lehman E. Gantt, a brother, Daniel W. Gantt, and a sister, Mrs. Malinda Brown, all of whom were members of the Presbyterian church. His pastor, the Rev. R. M. Ramsey, will officiate at his funeral.


