

Steel products from the plant of the Pennsylvania Steel Company will be exhibited at the Panama-Pacific Exposition in San Francisco, which opens next month.

Already a large quantity of material from both the local plant and the plant of the Maryland Steel Company, a subsidiary, at Sparrow's Point, Md., has been shipped to the coast. On Monday W. M. Henderson, of the local plant, will leave for the West to superintend the placing of the exhibit. He will have charge of it during the exposition.

The main exhibit will consist of products manufactured from Mayari ore from the company's mines at Felton, Cuba.



SMITH CALLS FOR THE B. & L. REPORTS

Banking Commissioner Issues Call to the Numerous Associations of the State



State Banking Commissioner H. Smith has issued a call to the 1,796 building and loan associations of the State, of which over 1,100 are in Philadelphia, to file reports for the business done in 1914. Acknowledgment of the call must be made in five days. The call in addition to calling for specific information says that associations incorporated during 1914 will make a report of that portion of the year in which they did business, up to and including December 31. Where no business was done during the year an affidavit to that effect must be filed with the department of banking.

Notice is given in the call that a fine will be imposed in case of delinquency in filing the report. In the last few years the State has been going into the business of the associations with great detail and the reports asked are comprehensive.

To Complete Arsenal.—Requests for an appropriation to complete the State Arsenal will be made to the Legislature when it meets again in the third week of the month. The appropriation made last session enabled the construction of the basement and first story and a sufficient sum to complete the structure will be asked. The building is to be fireproof and occupies a large portion of the State arsenal grounds in this city.

To Dine Governor.—Governor Tener went to Philadelphia this afternoon and will be the guest of members of his staff at a dinner at the Bellevue-Stratford to-night.

Big Payment Made.—The State Highway Department to-day paid \$53,000 to the State Treasury from automobile licenses.

After Eggless—gg Stuff.—Agents of the State Dairy and Food division have started after sellers of the compounds declared by State chemists not to contain any eggs. Dairy and Food Commissioner Foust says they will be rounded up within a few days.

Canners Meet Here.—A committee of employers and employees representing the big canning industry of the State met at the Department of Labor to-day to consider a standard of safety and sanitation for factories. The State Industrial Board will be asked to approve it.

Go Licenses.—Over 900 also licenses have been issued and it is believed the number will go to 1,000 next week.

or to let it by subcontract would cost practically the same.

As soon as the Pennsylvania Railroad awarded the King-Brown Company the contract for excavating and grading Mr. Taylor opened negotiations with that firm. His unusual success in obtaining the dirt at the price he has practically settled the north River front problem.

Haul Dirt in Auto Trucks

The King-Brown company is required by the contract to use clean earth without perishable or other unsatisfactory material and to dump at such points as the park officials shall designate. All stones large enough for a man to carry must be placed at least two feet below the surface.

Ten 5-ton and 4-ton trucks will be used to haul the dirt and the work will begin just as soon as an additional steam shovel is brought here to assist in the excavating. One shovel has been busy for the last week or so.

While \$4,000 is to be allowed for the River Front between Calder and Maclay streets, the park superintendent obtained the right to use as much earth as he wishes north of Maclay street at the rate of 26 2-3 cents per cubic yard.

U. S. WANTS COMPENSATION FOR HUNTERS' FAMILIES

Washington, Jan. 8.—The British embassy to-day was the recipient of a formal note from the United States government asking that the Canadian militiamen who shot and killed Walter Smith and wounded Charles Dorsch, American citizens at Fort Erie, Ont., while duck hunting in alleged violation of the Canadian game laws, be punished.

The communication was of a friendly nature and pointed out that it was expected the offenders would be duly punished and the victims' families adequately compensated.
