INDIAN SCOUT TROOP AT CARLISLE SCHOOL

First Organization of Kind Formed Entirely of Red Men in United States

Carlisle, Pa., Jan. 12.—Preparations are being made here for one of the most unique celebrations in the history of this section on Friday, January 23, when the members of the First Troop of Boy Scouts, of the Carlisle Indian School, the first composed entirely of Indians in the United States, will be formally received into the national membership.

It is planned to make this a gala day here, and at a meeting of the various troops of Boy Scouts it was voted that hereafter, when the exercises under their respective leaders, invitations will also be issued to troops at Harrisburg, Shippensburg, Chambersburg, Gettysburg and other points in this section.

Mr. Appell, field executive of the Scout work in the District of Columbia, will be here for the occasion. This troop was formed at the Carlisle Indian School, by Red Fox James, a blood Indian of the Blackfoot Nation, and a well-known frontiersman, who is taken a prominent part in Scout activities.
