Czar's Cousin, Who Visited Here Recently, Is Killed in Battle

An official statement from Berlin reports that Grand Duke Alexander Michaelovitch, a brother-in-law and cousin of the Czar, was killed in battle by the Turks at Mandouah, Persia. The grand duke visited America in the Fall of 1913 and was a guest of Mrs. John Astor at Beechwood, Newport. It is said that his mission at that time was the placing of orders for war materials in this country. The grand duke was 44, eight weeks older than the Czar. He was the fourth son of Grand Duke Michael and a grandson of Czar Nicholas I. His mother was the Princess of Baden. When quite young Alexander married the sister of the Czar. He was reckoned as one of the wealthiest members of the imperial family. Grand Duke Alexander visited Harrisburg on his way to Gettysburg and took luncheon at the Senate. The grand duke was the guest of Barclay Warburton, of Philadelphia. The latter, with his distinguished guest and other prominent Quaker City folks, made a trip to Gettysburg. Before leaving for the battlefield, a short trip was made along the River Front.

HARD COAL ROADS TO APPEAL CASE HERE

Public Service Commission's Decision Will Be Fought in Dauphin Co. Court

Philadelphia, Jan. 12. - The anthracite coal carrying railroads entering Philadelphia which were recently ordered by the Pennsylvania Public Service Commission to reduce their freight rates on hard coal forty cents a ton from the mines to Philadelphia, announced to-day they would take an appeal from the commission's decision to-morrow or Thursday to the Dauphin county court at Harrisburg under the provisions of the act creating the commission. According to the announcement, the effect of the reduction will be to diminish the net revenues of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company by approximately \$1,500,000 a year; the Philadelphia and Reading Railway approximately \$2,000,000 and other companies by several hundred thousand dollars.

"The importance to the State of Pennsylvania and to the city of Philadelphia of adequately conserving the revenue of the carriers," the statement says, "command that immediate action shall be taken to protect their revenue from such a widespread destruction as is involved under this order of the Pennsylvania Public Service Commission."
