CUTTERS SAVED 476 LIVES

Washington, D. C., Jan. 19.—Revenue cutters of the United States saved 476 lives and gave assistance to 210 vessels valued, with their cargoes, at more than \$9,000,000 during the fiscal year which ended June 30 last, according to a report to Congress by Commandant E. P. Berthoff. For every dollar expended by the service it aided in saving property worth \$3.72.

A Dainty Frock For Dances and the Like

A Youthful Model Adapted to Young Girls and to Women of Girlish Figures.

It would be hard to find a prettier dancing frock than this one. In one picture it is made of net over charmeuse satin and the girle and trimming are of the satin. In the other it is made of crepe de chine with the bodice of lace and trimming of velvet. Both frocks are charming and both are fashionable, but one of the great advantages of the design is to be found in its adaptability to different fabrics and different combinations. Here are two suggestions, a third variation can be made by using a lining silk for the skirt, charmeuse satin for the flounces, for the tunic, for the drapery and for the blouse, all-over lace for the body portion and chiffon velvet for the deep fringe, finishing the edges of the silk either with binding of the velvet or with the picot which is always pretty. The skirt is just a plain one in two pieces with the ruffles arranged over it. The tunic is straight and the little bodice can be made either with or without sleeves.

For the 16 year size will be needed 3 1/2 yds. of material 27, 3 1/2 yds. 36, or 2 1/2 yds. 44 in. wide, for blouse, skirt and girle, with 5 1/2 yds. 27, 3 1/2 yds. 36, or 3 1/2 yds. 44 in. wide, for the tunic, ruffles and the drapery.
