CENSUS TO BE EXTENDED

Lime and Tuberculosis

Dr. Roberts Bartholow, former professor of medicine at the University of Pennsylvania, and widely famed as a medical writer, says in the eighth edition of his book on "Lime and Tuberculosis" (1895), on pages 215 and 216: "Lime experience has shown that it (referring to a calcium salt) possesses the highest degree of activity as an alterative, removes certain toxic or morbid materials and secures their secretion by the organs of elimination."
