Congregationalist Shake-up in Denominational Boards

Complete Reorganization of Several National Societies Outlined by Commission

Not content with the radical progress recently made in stiffening up the denominational organization, with a permanent secretary or superintendent, the Congregationalists are going still further by consolidating a number of the denominational boards, or national societies, as they are technically called. The administrative scheme of these agencies by which Congregationalists do their nationwide work is also fundamentally revised.

A strong committee, appointed at the meeting of the National Council at Kansas City in 1913, has since been at work in order to report at the next meeting of the council, which will be held in New Haven in October. It has studied the question of furthering the efficiency of the national agencies by eliminating duplications, and of meeting the new conditions created by the changed times. President Henry Churchill King, of Oberlin, is chairman of the committee.

The report has now been made public through "The Congregationalist," that it may be discussed by the local congregations and associations. Lively debate is sure to follow in all these and throughout the denomination. The plan is not merely abstract administrative issue, for it vitally touches every Congregationalist, since it is through these agencies that he makes his contributions for national, religious and benevolent purposes.

Two Denominations Face Problem
As might be expected of any commission headed by President King, first importance is given to the whole problem of religious education. An examination of the elaborate and detailed report makes clear that this is more than a mere administrative scheme for the sake of economy and efficiency; but has a far greater objective, that of being nothing less than a fresh attempt to front the present problems of religious education in America.

The magnitude of this subject is suggested by the fact that two historical American denominations, the Congregationalists and Northern Presbyterians, are dealing with it in their highest courts during the present year. The concerted national campaign in behalf of Christian education of all denominations has already been treated in this column.

The Presbyterian special committee on education, which will report in May, proposes a consolidation of the college board and board of education. All members of the committee are agreed upon this. Whether the educational work of the Sunday School board shall be included in an open question, which is likely to be seriously affected by the action of the Congregationalists, who have gone far in reorganizing their Congregational Sunday School and Publishing Society.

Student Welfare and Life Work. This is a recognition of student evangelism and of the denomination's part in assisting to prepare young people for distinctive religious work.

A New Facing of Home Missions
Disregarding precedents, the commission has dealt with a strong hand with the whole problem of denominational propaganda and aggressive Christian activity. The Home Mission Extension group has been made to include the Home Missionary Society, the Congregational Church Building Society and the Sunday School Extension work of the Educational School and Publishing Society. All these are brought into one organization, with one general secretary, and the headquarters will be in New York. Under the control of this organization will be the work of planning and maintaining new churches of helping to erect church buildings and the inauguration and maintenance of mission Sunday Schools.

Publicity, Education and Social Service
Controversy is sure to rage around the third proposition of the commission, which changes the name of the Publishing Society to the Congregational Board of Religious Education. The aim is to make one comprehensive and unified agency for distinctly educational work of the church. This differs from the Missionary Education Group in that the latter accentuated the missionary end, and the objective of maintaining educational institutions.

The Board of Religious Education will be engaged in educational propaganda. All the present functions of the old board, except that of Sabbath School Extension, will remain in the new organization, with others of serious importance added thereto. As in the case of the other consolidations there will be one general secretary with all needed assistants.

Four departments are called for under the new scheme—publication, missionary education, social service and general religious education. The publication end includes the editing of the Sunday School literature, religious books, "The Congregationalist" and "Christian World" and other periodicals, and the manufacturing and marketing of all these publications.
