GERMAN REPLY CAN BE EXPECTED SOON

Answer to American Proposals Is Gradually Taking Definite Form

Berlin, Feb. 26, via London, 10 A. M.—The American note to Germany and Great Britain on the subject of food-stuffs to civilian populations of belligerents and submarine activities at sea, copy of which reached the German foreign office by Ambassador Gerard the night of February 22, has been a subject of exhaustive discussion...

Berlin Reports Loss of Seven British Cruisers Off Falkland Islands

Berlin, Feb. 26, by wireless to Sayville.—The Cologne Gazette has published a letter received in Germany from Montevideo, Uruguay, in which it is declared that seven British cruisers are lying at the Falkland Islands, in the southern Atlantic, severely damaged. This information has been brought into Montevideo the latter says, by the officers of an Argentine steamer.

It was in December of last year that a British squadron met and overcame a group of German cruisers off the Falkland Islands. Every one of the seven British warships which took part in this sea fight have since been reported in news dispatches as active in other marine fields.

Prohibition Victories in Two Western States

Des Moines, Iowa, Feb. 26.—Governor Clarke to-day signed the mulct law repeal bill recently passed by the legislature. The repeal goes into effect January 1, 1916, after which date statutory prohibition will prevail.

Boise, Idaho, Feb. 26.—The senate of the Idaho legislature to-day passed the state-wide prohibition bill, which makes the manufacture, sale and transportation for sale of intoxicating liquors unlawful after January 1, 1916. The vote was 23 to 6. Governor Alexander has announced that he will sign the measure.

Frick Plans Skyscraper on Most Valuable Lot

Pittsburgh, Feb. 26.—Tentative plans for an arcade business block, eight stories in height, to cover the old Cathedral plot, a full city block, valued at \$4,000,000, were approved here yesterday by H. C. Frick.

GERMANS PLANNING ANOTHER ATTACK ON ALLIES IN WEST

London, Feb. 26, 12.10 P. M.—The impression is gaining ground among British and French military commentators that Germany is preparing for a fresh expenditure of energy in the land campaign along the western front. Notwithstanding the recent successes of the Germans in the east they are apparently preparing for a stubborn resistance as at any time. The recuperating powers of the Russian armies, according to theories advanced here, have convinced the German general staff that it is wisest to adopt a defensive in the Russian campaign while delivering another blow in the west.

STEAMER STRIKES MINE

Amsterdam, Feb. 26, via London, 3.21 A. M.—The Swedish steamer Svarion, from Rotterdam, arrived today at Ymuiden, Holland, with a large hole in her starboard side near the bow. The captain reported that the vessel had been damaged on Thursday afternoon by either a mine or a torpedo. It is his opinion that the damage was inflicted by a mine.

WANTS CAMPAIGN INQUIRY

Washington, D. C., Feb. 26.—Investigation of the last Senate elections in Alabama, California, Indiana, Kentucky and Nevada, as well as Pennsylvania and Illinois, was proposed to a Senate committee to-day by Senator Bristow. The committee once decided not to investigate and later voted not to change its decision. The subject will come up again Monday.

BLOODHOUNDS TRAIL SLAYER

Aurora, Ill., Feb. 26.—In an old woolen glove the police to-day pinned the greatest clue to the murderer of the mysterious murderer who last night struck down Miss Emma Fross, 21 years old, near a place where the glove, with the weapon, was found within a half block of where the victim was killed. In the victim's handbag, opened and rifled, was found a block and a half away on the Northwestern Railroad tracks. Bloodhounds are being used.

PASSPORTS ARE DENIED

Paris, Feb. 26, 11.25 A. M.—Sixty-four applications for passports for American artists living in Paris have been refused by the American embassy in conformity with instructions recently received from the State Department at Washington requiring the present attainment of birth certificates.

CRUSHED BY CARS

Charles Lehr, aged 28, 1329 Berry hill street, a conductor on the Philadelphia and Reading, was caught between two cars last night while at work, fracturing his left clavicle. He was admitted to the Harrisburg Hospital.

PUDDLERS RESUME IN FULL

Girard, Ohio, Feb. 26.—The entire puddling department of the Girard Iron Company, consisting of eighty-eight furnaces, will resume operations in full next Monday.

SWAT KING BARLEYCORN

Copenhagen, via London, Feb. 26, 3.32 a. m.—The use of rye, barley, wheat, buckwheat and potatoes for the manufacture of spirits has been prohibited in Denmark.

WHEAT CUT 7 CENTS IN CHICAGO MARKETS

Fear of Reopening of Dardanelles Sends Price Down in Few Minutes

Chicago, Ill., Feb. 26.—Selling that bordered on a panic nature swept the wheat market down more than 7 cents a bushel to-day. The critical situation regarding the possible opening of the Dardanelles was chiefly responsible. May wheat sold as low as \$1.48 1/2 at the opening as against \$1.53 1/2 at the close last night. July wheat dropped 4 cents. Support from those who believe that the straits are still a long way from being open to the shipment of grain was forthcoming at the decline. May sold up to \$1.49 1/2 and July, which had touched \$1.21 1/4, advanced to \$1.22 within the first ten minutes of trading. On the second wave of selling May dropped to \$1.46 1/2, a fall of 7 1/2 cents compared with last night. The extreme setback for July meanwhile was 4 1/2 to 10 1/2 cents.

Naval Attache at German Embassy Denies Charges Made by Man in Tombs

New York, Feb. 26.—Federal authorities to-day are investigating a statement made by counsel for Richard P. Stegler, the German naval reservist, arrested in this city Wednesday night, that Captain Boy-Ed, naval attache to the German embassy in Washington had furnished an American passport to Carl Hans Lody, the German spy, who was put to death in the Tower of London last November. In his general denial of Stegler's statement involving him, Captain Boy-Ed referred to this allegation as "trash."


