WHAT IT MEANS TO PUT ON AN OPERA PRODUCTION Few people on the other side of the footlights have any idea of the work entailed in a production of opera such as The Boston English Opera Company's production of "Il Trovatore," which comes to the Majestic Theater, Saturday, matinee and night March 13.

First, comes the selecting of the principal artists, special care must be given to the roles which they are to sing. Then comes the selection of alternates and understudies. As opera singers, not only have vocal troubles occasionally--they also have temperamental attacks, which may prove disastrous unless they are covered. After that is attended to--the chorus is given attention. First, they are selected by the musical director. Not only must the voice be satisfactory, but they must fit in the stage pictures, so that groupings will harmonize. Then comes the rehearsal; the prin-

cipals with the musical director, the chorus with the assistant musical director. After a week of this musical director takes the entire company part of the day, the stage director takes the principals and the assistant stage director the chorus the balance of the day. Another week, and the entire company undergoes full rehearsals under the musical and stage directors.--Advertisement.
