

RITCHIE OUTPOINTS CHAMPION WELSH

Britisher Shows Remarkable Defensive Form; American Is a Trifle Wild at Times

New York, March 12.—Willie Ritchie, former lightweight champion easily outpointed Freddy Welsh, the champion lightweight of the world, in a ten-round bout at Madison Square Garden last night in a bout that was full of action from bell to bell.

Ritchie from the start, sailed into the Britisher and had the latter more than once hanging onto the ropes. In fact every round belonged to the champion who apparently was stung from the defeat he receive when he lost the title to Welsh and tried hard to retrieve himself.

Welsh, however, brought all of his defensive tactics into play and on more than one occasion his good defensive work of danger. Ritchie lost what little chance he had of scoring a K. O. through his wildness. Welsh through his cleverness, easily avoiding his opponent's vicious swings, who, at one part of the fight was going at a tremendous clip. In the last round Welsh appeared to be on queer street and he even surprised his most ardent admirers by the manner that he took all the gaff and then came up for more.

It was a fight where Ritchie did not allow the champion to get started properly, for he had right on top of the Britisher all through the fight and did not once let up, only in the sixth round, when Welsh got in a terrific right jolt to the jaw which straightened Ritchie and took quite a lot of vim out of the American until the end of the round. Ritchie was the aggressor right from the start, leading with a left uppercut which did good work. Welsh lost in some hard fighting on the jaw and made everyone count, but they did not appear in the least to slow up Ritchie, who always kept boring in. It was a victory for Ritchie, but a knockout is necessary to bring back championship.

FEDS POSTPONE MEETING

Schedule Framers Resume Duties at Chicago on Monday

Chicago, March 12.—The schedule meeting of the Federal league, which was set for Pittsburgh next Saturday, has been postponed until Monday and will be held in Chicago. The postponement was caused by the suit filed by the Kansas City Federal league club, which seeks to restrain the league from transferring its franchise to Newark, N. J. The hearing was continued by Circuit Judge Baldwin yesterday until Monday, when the contending counsel will be given two and a half hours for argument.
