

GIBBONS' TALKS ONE OF HIS BILLS

Would Permit Boroughs to Have Representatives at the State Capital All Year

Representative Ralph Gibson, of Lycoming county, sponsor of the bill to permit boroughs to maintain representatives here, has issued a statement explaining the bill. The statement says: "There are thirty-six cities and over 1,100 boroughs in Pennsylvania which so far as public utilities are concerned, have more or less to do with the Public Service Commission. The fixing of rates, the regulation of rates, the approval of contracts are all matters of vital interest to municipalities, but they are within the jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission. Unless the commission should conduct hearings in each one of these municipalities, the authorities or representatives are put to great expense and inconvenience in order to appear before the commission to uphold or present or safeguard the affairs and interests of the municipality. Many of these matters are of a minor nature that could be resolved by a mere application or at least by a short hearing. But whether the hearing is short or long, whether the application is minor or major, the expense to which the municipality is put, still remains the same. If, however, better would it be then if the municipalities in Pennsylvania could unite for mutual help. The expense of maintaining a corps of representatives in Harrisburg to represent each city and borough before any branch of the State government would be comparatively small and could be graduated according to population. Two men learned in the law at a salary each of \$10,000 per year would do far more with their accumulated expert knowledge than would the ordinary representatives of the municipality whose experience would necessarily be limited. Furthermore, the expense of bringing to Harrisburg on each occasion the counsel or authorities of the municipality would be far greater than the amount each municipality would be able to pay if it enters into an association such as is here projected. "This bill is only permissive. The municipality may take it or leave it; there is no compulsion. If the bill becomes a law, each municipality in the State can at small expense, have its own command in Harrisburg to represent it well and continuously, one or more men—able, skilled, experienced, efficient."




